

Mrs. Wilson Speaks of Outdoor Meals

The Preparations Need Not Be Very Elaborate; in Fact, the Simpler They Are the Better

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THE housewife who has the family away in the city at business during the day should plan several real outdoor meals for them at the close of the day. The family can join you coming out directly after business, and if you do not have a car, and no growing children to help you, then take a few youngsters from the neighborhood along. They, too, will enjoy the outing, and help you carry the supper.

The packing and stowing of the utensils needed for the outdoor meal need not be very elaborate, and the entire outfit can be packed in a suitcase. Paper drinking cups, plates and napkins soon solve the china and linen question, so that all you will really have to worry with will be the utensils to carry the drinking water or tea and the food itself.

Supper Menus for Outdoor Meals, at Fresco

No. 1
Chilled Chicken, a la King, in tomato cases
Brown Bread and Butter Sandwiches
Chocolate Cake
Ice Cream

No. 2
Cold Chicken Pie
Potato Salad
Tomatoes au naturel
Fruit Tarts Lemonade

No. 3
Potted Chicken and Ham
Vegetable Salad
Tomato au naturel
Cantaloupe Lemonade

No. 4
Deviled Eggs Parisien
Cheese and Nut Sandwiches
Radishes
Fruit Ade

Use a piece of oilcloth to line the suitcase and have everything laid out before packing. Pack and turn in the oilcloth and then cover with several thicknesses of newspapers. This will prevent the heat from coming in contact with the food. Do not open until the family arrives, and it will take just a few minutes to unpack and serve this meal.

Brown Bread
Place in mixing bowl
One cup of cornmeal
One cup of whole wheat flour,
One and one-half cups of bread crumbs,
One teaspoon of salt,
Two tablespoons of baking powder,
Three-quarters cup of molasses,
One and one-half cups of black coffee,
One cup of seeded raisins,
One-half cup of chopped nuts.
Mix well, and then turn in a well-greased and floured mold and steam for one and a half hours; remove the lid from the mold and place in slow oven to dry off; use when a day old.

The one-pound coffee cans make splendid molds, and the batter should be about two-thirds full. Have the water in the kettle about two-thirds the depth of the molds, and cover the kettle closely.
To prepare the butter for the sandwiches place in small bowl
Two ounces of butter,
One teaspoon of mustard,
One-half teaspoon of paprika,
One teaspoon of grated onion.
Blend well together and add one-half cup of finely chopped parsley; work to smooth paste and use on the bread for the sandwiches.

Chilled Chicken, a la King
Place in saucepan
One and one-half cups of milk,
One-half cup of chicken stock,
One-half cup of flour.
Blend and stir until the flour is dissolved; then place on the stove and bring to a boil; cook for five minutes and add
One teaspoon of salt,
One-quarter cup of melted butter,
One-half teaspoon of mustard,
One-half teaspoon of paprika,
One-half cup of capers,
One small can of pimientos, chopped fine.

The breast of a four and a half pound chicken cut in blocks,
Four hard-boiled eggs cut in quarters.
Heat slowly to boiling point and cool. Chill well. Now select large, firm tomatoes and scoop out the centers; turn on cloth to drain and fill with prepared and chilled chicken a la King; return to refrigerator and chill until needed.

Potted Chicken and Ham
Put through the food chopper
Sufficient cold cooked chicken to measure three-quarters cup,
Sufficient cold cooked ham to measure one-half cup,
Season with
One tablespoon of grated onion,
One-quarter cup of finely chopped parsley,
One-half cup of finely chopped pimientos,
One-half cup of finely chopped capers,
One teaspoon of salt,
One-half teaspoon of pepper,
One-half teaspoon of mustard.
Mix well, and now adjust the nut butter knife to the food chopper and put the entire mixture through. Pack in individual custard cups and pour one tablespoon of melted and strained butter over each cup; place on ice to chill and when ready to pack turn into the little paper cups that are used for ice creams.






