Promises to Explain in Full His Administration at Next Audit Meeting

Harrisburg, June 22.—Harmon M. Kephart, former State Treasurer, denied today that he is guilty of the misuse of State funds as charged in the sixth section of the report of Main & Co., accountants who examined the Treasury books from Mar. 1917, to May, 1921.

Mr. Kephart admitted that he reimbursed himself for traveling expenses because he was under the impression that this was the practice among State officials.

Mr. Kephart declared that he will be able to show that all the money he received from the State Treasury was used for the purposes for which it was intended.


