The Unconscious Sinner






Color Properties

What the Theory of the Gyroscope Is Few ask "what makes a top spin?" in apparent violation of the law of gravitation. Scientists have marveled at the phenomenon of the spinning top. The first man to apply the underlying principle to practical use was Leon Foucault, who invented the first gyroscope, which is a rotating wheel with a shaft free to pivot in any direction.

The motion of the gyroscope is based on the well-known law of Newton that bodies will continue in their state of rest or motion except as acted upon by an outside force. A gyroscope, therefore, will maintain the angle of its axis in relation to space regardless of the rotating earth, while at the same time its axis is parallel to the surface of the earth, as another point its axis is parallel to the earth. If some outside force is applied to a gyroscope, the motion of the gyroscope will be the resultant of two forces.
