

COUNT TO CONTEST U. S. WIFE'S SUIT

Denies Maryland County Court Has Jurisdiction in Divorce Proceedings

WIFE CHARGES DESERTION

Baltimore, July 8.—Count Vladislav Ledochowski, of Warsaw, Poland, whose wife, the Countess Louise Warfield Ledochowski, a daughter of Edwin Warfield, formerly Governor, on May 1 filed a petition in the Circuit Court of Howard County for a decree of absolute divorce, will contest the suit, according to Attorney George W. Swinski.

In her bill Countess Ledochowski asked the Court to grant a divorce on the grounds of abandonment and infidelity, and to grant her the custody of their three minor children, three, eight years old; Mary A. Jadwiga, four years old, and Leon Stanislaus, three years old, and an allowance of permanent alimony.

SEEK AID OF U. S. TO SAVE GERMANY

British Broach Subject as Collapse of Mark Brings Financial Crisis

FRANCE IS STORM CENTER

London, July 8.—American Embassy officials said today that while no formal representations had been made by the British Government looking to the participation of the United States in allied efforts to rehabilitate Germany, the subject had been discussed for some time in diplomatic and other circles and the hope expressed that the United States might be induced to lend its support to the project.

In the present state of Europe's financial depletion little can be done by the Allies to restore Germany's shattered economic structure without the assistance of the United States. Ambassador Harbo has discussed informally with Prime Minister Lloyd George and other officials the financial plight of Germany and Austria and it is believed he has laid the British viewpoint before the State Department.

The collapse of the German mark will be unable to meet her July reparations payment due a week from today. The plight of the European exchanges in general calls for some gloomy comments.

The financier, Sir George Patish, who condemns France's attitude on the reparations question, has an article in the Westminster Gazette declaring that the situation is rapidly moving toward complete destruction of the value of the German currency and that probably no country will suffer more than France in this disaster.

STAYS HIS CRIMES TO GIRL'S GHOST

Stewart, Unfrooked Minister, Says Jilted Woman, Suicide, Haunted Him

CHARGE CHAIN OF BIGAMY

Boston, July 8.—The ghost of a jilted sweetheart who had committed suicide, and who haunted his every step and drove him to seek refuge in matrimony, is the theme of a play by Donald Stewart, unfrooked minister, for his chain of bigamous marriages, stealings and fraud plots.
