TITLE CLAIMS OF IVEY ARE REFUTED

Thirty-six of the world's leading sprint professionals will compete in a 100-kilometer team race, 62 1/2 miles, at the Philadelphia Velodrome, Point Breeze Park, Thursday night.

Any team or teams gaining a lap must compete in every sprint to score points. A lap gained and held to the finish will win, but in the event of one team lapping the field in the early part of the race and another team gaining a lap later, the team with the largest number of points will win.

Two Philadelphia teams have been entered. They are Jake Smith and Frank Harris and George Patterson and George Geerley. This quartet has been winning races consistently on the local track.
