

# HEALING INDORSED BY EPISCOPALIANS

## Church Formally Placed on Record Recognizing Ministry

### APPROVE TWO NEW PRAYERS

Portland, Ore., Sept. 22.—The Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States has been formally placed on record in recognition of the ministry of healing. The recognition was accorded last night by a vote of the House of Bishops at the annual convention of the House of Deputies at the general convention here.

The bishops' action authorizes clergy members, who believe they possess powers of healing, to prepare themselves by care and prayer and theological and medical study, for their proper and safe exercise. During the session it was made that wherever this provision is specialized those who exercise it shall do so only with the written approval "after due consideration of their bishop and in sympathetic conference with qualified Christian physicians."

A commission was named to consider further the matter of having Bishop Thomas F. Gailer, Bishop of Tennessee, was re-elected president of the National Council by the House of Bishops on the seventh ballot. Bishop Brent moved to make the election unanimous, which was immediately done.

Nomination was made by the Bishops for a Suffragan Bishop for South Dakota, in place of William P. Remington, transferred to Eastern Oregon. The Rev. William Blair Roberts, a graduate of Trinity College and the Berkeley Seminary, dean of the Rosebud Convocation in South Dakota, was the only name placed in nomination and it was seconded by eleven Bishops. During the year he saw service as the front chaplain of a regiment of engineers. There being no other nomination, Mr. Roberts' election is assured. He is forty years of age.

The House of Bishops adopted the following prayer for use in the marriage service:

"O Almighty God, creator of mankind, Who only art the wellspring of life, bestow upon these Thy servants, if it be Thy will, the gift and heritage of children; and grant that they may see their children brought up in Thy faith and fear to the honor and glory of Thy name; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen."

A new prayer for the insane was approved and sent to the House of Deputies.

The following have been appointed members of the Joint Commission on the Ministry of Healing: Bishops

Theodore D. Bratton, of Mississippi; Charles H. Brent, of Western New York; David Ross, of Louisiana; William A. Guerry, Herman Page, Theodore I. Reese, the Revs. Wilmer Gresham, of San Francisco; George F. Wold, of Los Angeles; E. C. Sherman, of Akron, O.; Dr. Philomen F. Sturges, of Providence, R. I.; Dr. H. P. Abbott, of Baltimore; Messrs. R. I. Manning, of South Carolina; Morris Earle, of Philadelphia; W. J. Old, Jr., of Virginia; Dr. W. F. Smith, director of Johns Hopkins Hospital; Dr. Edward S. Cowles, of New York, and Dr. Lucian of San Francisco. The resolution of the convention required the choice of three physicians.

Lewis B. Franklin, of New York, was elected treasurer of the domestic and foreign missionary society.

By vote of the bishops the proposal to recognize deaconesses as an order in the ministry and provide for their ordination was referred back to the commission to report at the next convention. Strong opposition was offered to the suggestion that married women should be permitted to serve as deaconesses.

The first clash between high and low churchmen in this convention took place in the House of Deputies on a proposed addition to the prayer for the church militant in communion service. Low churchmen particularly objected to a paragraph praising the Lord for all His saints and mentioning the name of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and also to a new prayer for the dead, reading as follows: "Remember, O Lord, all Thy servants who have gone before us with the sign of faith; be merciful unto them, and to all who rest in Christ, and grant them peace and joy; and may the light of Thy presence shine upon them."

## WINS MILLION BY DIVORCE

### Wife of Connecticut Manufacturer Is Given Decree

San Francisco, Sept. 22.—(By A. P.)—Mrs. Robert Stewart Howard, wife of a Danbury, Conn., piano manufacturer, obtained an interlocutory decree of divorce here yesterday. A \$1,000,000 property settlement is said to have been effected out of court.

The decree was granted upon the ground of desertion. They were married in January, 1920.


