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Mrs. Stillman Wins; Baby Guy Legitimate, Referee Decides

Banker, Declared to Be Guilty of Misconduct With Broadway Show Girl, Is Refused Divorce

EVIDENCE HELD UNTRUSTWORTHY

Master Says Examination of Testimony Has Shaken His Faith in Its Truthfulness

Carmel, N. Y., Sept. 29.—James A. Stillman, former president of the National City Bank of New York, was denied a decree in his suit for absolute divorce against his wife, Anne U. Stillman, and their baby, Guy Stillman, was declared legitimate in the findings of Daniel J. Gleason, referee in the case, which were filed here today.

The referee's decision was a complete victory for Mrs. Stillman. Not only was her defense upheld, but the referee also confirmed her charges that Mr. Stillman had mis-conducted himself with Florence H. Leeds, former Broadway show girl, and that Mrs. Leeds had borne two children.

In regard to Mrs. Stillman's charges that her banker-husband had also mis-conducted himself with two other women, identified only as "Helen" and "Clara," Referee Gleason decided that the evidence was not sufficient to prove the allegations.

Two of the banker's attorneys, Colleton William Rand and Outerbridge Horsey, waiting to hear the decision in Mr. Gleason's office at Poughkeepsie, declined to say whether they intended to appeal from the referee's findings.

The referee wrote that the testimony adduced by Mr. Stillman in support of his charges that Mrs. Stillman mis-conducted herself with Fred Bonaville, half-breed girl, alleged by the banker to be the father of little Guy Stillman, "uncontradicted and unexplained, was sufficient to justify him (Stillman) in believing Mrs. Stillman guilty of the charges against her."

"A careful examination, however, of all the facts," said his report, "has shaken my faith and belief in the testimony of the witnesses called in the plaintiff's behalf."

Legitimacy Presumption Upheld

The referee held that Mr. Stillman had failed to overcome the presumption of legitimacy, "which is one of the strongest known to the law, and which cannot be overturned except by evidence which is stronger."

On the other hand, the report found that the father of Guy Stillman, Guy Faust, had been "so overwhelming and convincing that the plaintiff's attorneys frankly stated to the referee that no denial would be made of these charges."

Mrs. Stillman, the referee held, not only offered evidence tending to establish the untruth and falsity of the evidence of misconduct, but also offered evidence tending to show that agents of Mr. Stillman offered inducements of money to the father of Guy Stillman, who was recommended that the plaintiff's complaint should be dismissed.

The referee's report, upon motion by the defendant, was accepted by Judge Justice Morschauer for confirmation or rejection. It is expected that Justice Morschauer will uphold the findings of Mr. Gleason.

Unusual Action, Says Master

"This is a very unusual action," said the referee, "and it is unusual without contradiction that, since at least as early as 1916 and ever since that date during the continuance of this action and down to at least March, 1921, the plaintiff has been intimate with a woman not his wife, known as Florence H. Leeds; has supported and maintained her."

THREE BANDITS ROB AND KIDNAP WAITER IN U. S. COLLEGES

Majestic Employee, Another Man and Two Women in Taxi Hold-Up at Park and Olney Aves.

\$2000 DIAMOND RING SAVED

William L. Faust, head waiter at the Majestic Hotel, was kidnaped by three motor bandits early today after he had been held up at Park and Olney avenues.

The party included Louis Berg, also a hotel employee, and Clara Boger and Madeleine Verano, employees of the Brix Arms Cafe. The men were escorting the women to their homes.

The robbers took \$31 and their gold watches, from Faust and Berg and then threw Faust into their gray motor car carrying New Jersey license No. 9579.

Gag Victim

As the fleeing robbers sped away with their captive, they gagged the struggling man, ripped off his coat lining and even took off his shoes in their hunt for money. They threw him from the car at Linden avenue and Ninoyan lane.

Berg and the woman watched in amazement for a few moments as Faust was carried away. Then Berg noticed the Bennington police station and Motorcycle Patrolmen Sell and Frailey tried in vain to pick up the trail of the robbers on Olney avenue.

Faust and Berg were in evening dress and police believe the bandits espied them leaving the hotel with the woman after the café had been closed. Faust had engaged a taxi driven by Jacob Reicher, 1732 Green street. The taxi reached Park and Olney avenues near the home of the woman at 8:30 o'clock.

Berg Robbed of \$10

Berg was robbed of \$10, but he saved a jeweled watch by sticking it in his coat lining. He noted the license number of the bandit car and police telegraphed to Trenton to learn the name of the owner. It is believed the machine was stolen from a Trenton garage.

Two young men walked into the restaurant of Theodore Baltz, Seventy-third street and Elmwood avenue, last night and attempted to hold up the proprietor, who was sitting at the counter when the two entered and demanded that he "put 'em up."

FINLETTER THROWS KEMAL ASSURES BRITISH DRUG CHIEFS' PLEAS OUT OF HIS COURT THAT TURKS WILL HALT; HOPE FOR PEACE GROWS

Tells Peddlers He Has No Right to Review Decision of Judge Monaghan

REFUSES TO HEAR PLEA FOR REDUCTION OF BAIL

Rules That Decision of One Quarter Sessions Jurist Cannot Be Overruled by Another

Judge Finletter in Quarter Sessions Court today dealt a smashing blow to the "drug ring" when he refused to even listen to an appeal from the six alleged leaders in the drug traffic who sought to get their bail reduced by habeas corpus proceedings.

Five of the six were held in \$25,000 bail; the sixth in \$30,000 bail, and they came to court convinced that the judge would cut their bonds to \$10,000 or less.

Instead he told them firmly, and with few words, that Judge Monaghan's decision in their cases represented the opinion of the entire bench and they could expect no leniency from him.

The six who made the attempt to get out were Joseph Allegro, alias Joe Rittello; Felice Cardullo; Joseph Weiss; Hyman Gold, alias "Young Mahoney"; Anthony Pilla and Frank Piccone.

Of these six Cardullo is entitled in \$30,000 bail, the others in \$25,000 bail.

Based Hope on Annie Miller Case

All six came in on writs of habeas corpus, asked for a few days ago.

3 BULLETS KILLED SINGER, THROAT CUT

Evidences of Savagery Bared by Autopsy on Exhumed Body of Mrs. Mills

Three bullets from a .32-caliber automatic pistol were fired into the head of Mrs. Eleanor Reinhardt Mills, singer in the choir of the Church of St. John the Evangelist, who was murdered two weeks ago yesterday.

This was announced positively and the bullets themselves recovered when the body was exhumed today from its resting place in Van Liew Cemetery, near the intersection of the street and an autopsy performed in Cooper Hospital's morgue on Bayard street, New Brunswick.

The autopsy was performed by Dr. Runkle Hageman, of Somerville, Somerset County, and Dr. A. L. Smith, of New Brunswick, who were assisted by Joseph H. Hildner, a surgeon who operated on Mrs. Mills several months before her death. Present were Dr. William H. Long, Cooper's physician of Somerset County, and Dr. E. J. Cronk, city physician of New Brunswick. Dr. Long made the original anatomical examination of the body and Dr. Cronk viewed it later, having been retained to do so by the Mills family. Prosecutor A. M. Beckman, of Somerset County, also was there.

Originally it was planned to exhumate only Mrs. Mills' body. There is a new

NO FURTHER ADVANCE WILL BE MADE, NATIONALIST CHIEF SAYS

PARLEY WILL BE HELD TO PREVENT CONFLICT

Withdrawal of Ottoman Cavalry From Chanak Neutral Zone Forecast

CROWN PRINCE BECOMES KING GEORGE OF GREECE

Venizelos Asked to Aid—Strong Report Sultan Has Abdicated

Constantinople, Sept. 29.—Mustapha Kemal Pasha, replying to General Harrington's telegram of Wednesday, has sent a message declaring his troops would not advance further. He says he desires that no incident should occur and that he will see General Harrington as soon as possible.

The situation at Chanak, where the British and Turkish troops are almost elbowing each other, was unchanged today.

The meeting between General Harrington and Mustapha Kemal is expected to occur tonight, and it is believed here it will result in the withdrawal of the Kemalist cavalry from the Chanak neutral zone.

General Harrington will point out the necessity of the discontinuance of the Turkish movements there, which are considered equivalent to the reconnoitering of the British position.

Brigadier General Harrington left this afternoon for the conference with Kemal, probably at Mudania, on the Sea of Marmora.

British Hope for Peace

The British are confident that if the next twenty-four hours pass without the firing of shots at Chanak or other points along the Dardanelles, all immediate danger of hostilities will have been averted, several persons here estimated that it would be required for General Harrington's journey and his return interview with Mustapha Kemal.
