

ROBBERY COLLISION WHICH INJURED 26

Police and trolley company officials are today investigating the cause of the crash of two trolley cars at Richmond and Madison streets during the rush hour last night, when more than a score of passengers were injured, three seriously.

Both cars, on the newly instituted Richmond street extension of the P. & D., were heavily loaded with home-going workmen. A northbound car on Route 73 ran through an open switch at Madison street and crashed into the southbound car on the same division.

The 120 passengers were tumbled in places. Men and women, cut and bleeding from shattered glass and timbers, were removed from the wreck they were rushed to the Northeastern, Frankford and Episcopal Hospitals in nearby cars called into service.
