Charged With Intoxication, Leader of Reform Movements They Admit Taking a 'Couple of Drinks' and Long Picturesque Figure in Washington Lobbies

Washington, Dec. 27.—Dr. Wilbur F. Crafts, the twenty-eight year superintendent of the International Reform Bureau, which he founded, and widely known because of his activities on behalf of prohibition and similar movements, died at a hospital here today of pneumonia.

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McKONIGETS WRIT OF HABEAS CORPUS; FIGHTS EXTRADITION

Former Mer Rouge, La., Mayor, Arrested in Baltimore, Seeks Release on Bail

HELD ON MURDER CHARGE IN CONNECTION WITH KLAN

Denies He Is Ku Klux Member, but Condone "Crusade" of Hooded Gangs

Special Dispatch to Evening Public Ledger—Baltimore, Dec. 27.—Dr. Bunnell McEwin McKoin will fight to the last die extradition to Louisiana, where he is charged with the murder of Thomas F. Richards and F. Watt Daniels.

They disappeared last summer and their bodies were found a few days ago in Lake La Fourche. Dr. McKoin, former Mayor of Mer Rouge, is under arrest here. Suspicion has rested on the Ku Klux Klan in the murders.

As the first move in the fight former United States District Attorney Robert R. Carmann, who has been retained by the physician as his counsel, obtained a writ of habeas corpus asking for the release of Dr. McKoin on bail until given a hearing on the extradition charges.

While the writ was returnable forthwith, the hearing was postponed until tomorrow.

About the same time there arrived here a telegram from Governor John M. Parker, of Louisiana, which read: "Hold Dr. McKoin for extradition. Papers will be forwarded. Many thanks."

"I intend to fight any effort at extradition," said Mr. Carmann as he obtained the writ from Judge James P. Gorter, sitting in the City Court. "I do not believe that there is any prima facie charge of murder against Dr. McKoin at Mer Rouge. I believe that this is but a subterfuge to get him there to question him."

Dr. McKoin did not flee from Louisiana after the trouble at Mer Rouge. He remained there for many weeks after the death of the two men. He was with his father, thirty miles away from Mer Rouge, from August until October, when he came to Baltimore at the request of Dr. Hugh H. Young, who offered to permit him to associate with him at the Johns Hopkins Hospital.

"The Mayor placed himself at the disposal of the District Attorney at his court, and was in communication with him for a long time before he left. There was nothing for him to hide, and he gave whatever information he had at his command."

Taken Back to Jail

Dr. McKoin, who is charged with participation in the Ku Klux Klan outrages, was taken from the City Jail to the office of State Attorney Robert F. Leach, Jr., preliminary to appearing before Judge Gorter. When the habeas corpus hearing was postponed, he was taken back to the police station.

Dr. Young, who is a noted specialist, went to the hospital and offered to produce bail for Dr. McKoin. Dr. McKoin, however, went to the private office of Judge Gorter with Attorney Carmann, announcing that one of his interests was to appear before the court, and that he would be appearing before Judge Gorter. When the habeas corpus hearing was postponed, he was taken back to the police station.

Held for Ten Days

Dr. McKoin was held in the county jail here for ten days, after which he was taken into custody at the Broad Street station.

"I have a telegram from Governor John M. Parker of Louisiana, reporting that he has been held for the authorities of Mer Rouge on the charge of murder of Mr. Richards and F. Watt Daniels."

Broken Arm Causes Amundsen Trouble
