MINORS TAKE ACTION AGAINST GAMBLING AND GAME THROWING

Defer Consideration of New National Agreement Until Tuesday.

Chicago, Jan. 10.—The National Association of Minor Leagues, at its meeting Monday, adopted several amendments to its constitution, including one designed to stamp out gambling and game throwing and another creating a board of control to supervise post-season interleague games.

The meeting was a continuation of the one held some time ago in Kansas City, but the work of revising the constitution was not finished Monday and will be the first business when the club owners and league presidents reconvene Tuesday.

No action was taken concerning the proposal to join with the major leagues in signing a new national agreement that matter being left until the minor league drafting committee meets with the majors' committee Tuesday.

The president of the association was given the responsibility of seeing that baseball in the minor leagues is kept free from the influence of gamblers.

An amendment to the constitution which was adopted directed him to take any steps advisable to investigate gambling.

The association also authorized its president to negotiate with heads of industrial and independent leagues with a view of entering signed agreements with them which would protect the organized clubs in the ownership of players.

To Draft Uniform Boxing Laws at New York Meeting

New York, Jan. 10.—Formation of a national governing body for the control of professional boxing was begun here Monday at a convention of 15 states.

Temporary committees were chosen. These will meet Tuesday morning and report when the convention reassembles in the afternoon to effect a permanent organization, to be tentatively known as the National Board of Boxing Control.

The board will endeavor to obtain uniform boxing laws in all states, limit purses to contestants and admission prices and compel champions to defend their titles within stated periods.

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MAJORS PUT POKER ON NEW AGREEMENT MINORS MAY JOIN

Big League Committees Accept Reorganization Plan With Landis Commission.

Chicago, Jan. 10.—Committees chosen by the two major baseball leagues to draw up a new national agreement Monday officially voted their approval of the agreement formulated in New York recently which provided for reorganization of the game with Federal Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis as baseball commissioner.

The action of the committees put at rest rumors that the American league was not satisfied with the agreement and that consequently a new fight might break out between the major organizations.

The agreement will be formally acted on by the two leagues probably Tuesday, but this action is looked upon by baseball men as a mere formality, the national league already having signed the agreement and President Johnson of the American league having officially announced that the agreement met with the approval of the club owners in his circuit.

Prospectors of the minor leagues joining with the majors appeared bright although no action on the agreement was taken at their meeting. The minor league drafting committee will meet with the two major league committees Tuesday morning when it is believed that all differences of opinion concerning the rules under which the game should be governed will be settled.

ENGLISH ATHLETES PLANNING TO MEET YANKEES IN SPRING

International Intercollegiate Contest May Result From Cornell's Trip.

New York, Jan. 10.—An international intercollegiate sporting contest in this country next spring appears certain as the result of the Cornell university cross country team to England during the Christmas holidays.

Word to this effect was brought back by Manager McGovern and Trainer Jack Moulley, who arrived Monday with the seven Cornell runners who competed against the combined Oxford-Cambridge universities team at Rouhampton, England, on December 20.

Mr. McGovern stated the undergraduates and alumni of Cambridge university were ardently in favor of a return athletic visit to Cornell next spring.

Both he and Coach Moulley were assured that if faculty permission could be obtained, an eight oared crew or a complete track and field team, or both, would be sent to them for participation in the annual spring days sports' carnival usually held in May.

Other scores were: C. L. Finnigan, 90 per cent; E. C. Longacker, 88 per cent; Arvey Shultz, 84 per cent; Al Roushar, 84 per cent.

Woodberry High Gun Boxers May Not Wear U. S. Flag in Ring, Is Massachusetts Rule

Boston, Jan. 10.—Wearing of the American flag by boxers appearing in Massachusetts is prohibited in a ruling announced Monday by the state boxing commission.

The ruling was made at the request of the American Legion. The commission also requested that boxers refrain from making lodge signs in the ring.

Lew Wallace, author of "Ben Hur," was a member of the commission which tried the assassins of Abraham Lincoln.

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80 MILES AN HOUR CRAFT TO DEFEND HAMSWORTH TROPHY

Gar Wood, However, Doesn't Expect Challenge From British Isles in 1921.

Detroit, Jan. 10.—A speed boat capable of 80 miles an hour, will be required to successfully defend the Harmsworth trophy, according to Gar Wood, who captured the international trophy from its British holders off the Isle of Wight last summer.

Wood, who holds most of the world's speed boat records, indicated that he did not believe a challenge would be forthcoming for the Harmsworth trophy in 1921. European powerboat men realize, he said, that they must build a craft capable of close to 80 miles an hour to compete with hydroplanes of the type of Miss America. He pointed out that Miss America's fastest lap in the recent gold cup race here was 71.5 miles an hour.

"This won't do in the race for the Harmsworth trophy, however," he said, and added, "We will be right there with that 80 mile an hour boat when the challenge for the international trophy comes."

Wood said prospects were bright for a Harmsworth race in 1922 that would shatter all records.

Boston, Jan. 10.—Soccer, the English national game, like organized baseball in this country, has come into an era of high player values. There has been no transaction rivaling the "Babe" Ruth deal for \$100,000 as yet, but word has been received here of the sale for \$20,000 of Stanley Fazzacker, a crack soccer forward, who played on local fields for nothing a few years ago. The price of his purchase by the Everton club in England was said to set the high mark for the British national sport.
