

MAYOR OF CORK'S DEPORTATION SENT TO LABOR BUREAU

President's Proclamation Is Authority for Action, Acting Secretary States.

Washington, Jan. 11.—Deportation of Donal O'Callaghan, lord mayor of Cork, who arrived at Newport News last week as a stowaway and without passport, was requested of the department of labor yesterday by Acting Secretary Davis of the state department.

Mr. Davis' request was in writing. He quoted as his authority for action the proclamation issued by President Wilson August 8, 1918, designating the secretary of state as the one who shall decide whether an alien coming under passport regulations should be admitted or denied to the country.

New York, Jan. 11.—The legal right of the state department to issue an order of deportation for Lord Mayor Donal O'Callaghan of Cork, requested by Acting Secretary of State Davis will be contested in the courts if necessary, counsel for the lord mayor announced here Tuesday.

OLD INDIAN FIGHTER IS VISITOR IN GREAT FALLS; WAS IN MANY OF EARLY DAY BATTLES IN MONTANA


A participant in some of the Indian campaigns with General George A. Custer before the famous fight was killed in the battle of the Little Big Horn with the Sioux in 1876, scout on a dozen big campaigns in the early days in Montana and one of the party under General Miles which followed Chief Joseph and his Nez Perce band before its capture—this might be given as a brief life history of Colonel G. R. (Bill) Norris of Lewistown, who is at the Park hotel for a few days business visit in Great Falls.

Colonel Norris came to Montana in 1867 on a steamer plying up the Missouri river. At that time the country was virtually a "no man's land," possession being bitterly contested by the handful of adventurous fur traders and placer miners and the roving bands of Indians. From the time he came until the territory was settled Colonel Norris participated in many of the larger Indian campaigns. His partner, Charles Reynolds, was one of the scouts killed with Custer in the disastrous battle with the Sioux near what is now Miles City.

The Bear Paw Mountain fight with Chief Joseph's Nez Perces near the present site of Big Sandy, was one of the battles in which the Colonel took part.

An interesting incident in connection with the fight is told by him. Chief Joseph and his band were traveling through the Yellowstone park country

when they captured a party of Englishmen hunting big game. The English-

men had with them a new model high power rifle equipped with telescope

sights and a quantity of ammunition. The Indians took the piece and set some of their best marksmen to work learning to shoot it. At the battle of Bear Paw mountains they mounted the weapon on a tripod inside a rude stockade and during the fight turned it on the whites with deadly effect, 40 of them being killed at ranges of 600 to 700 yards.

Asks \$600 Damages for Auto Collision

Suit was brought in district court Tuesday by N. T. Granberry of Great Falls against Ole Everson in an attempt to recover \$600 damages, alleged to have resulted from an automobile accident due to Everson's negligence. Granberry alleges that his automobile was struck December 12 by the defendant's car on the Great Falls-Tracy road and that he sustained a loss in the amount sued for through damage to his machine and from equipment lost to thieves after he had been compelled to leave the car by the roadside. The cars crashed, according to the complaint, because of the defendant's failure to turn out to the right and give half the road.

Myersick Settles Alleged Bad Checks

Charles L. Myersick, arrested at Harlowton last week on a charge of issuing worthless checks to the Park hotel, will be released from the county jail today (Wednesday) following settlement of the amounts held against him, it was stated Tuesday by County Attorney H. G. Bennett. Checks aggregating about \$150 were held against Myersick in Great Falls, it is alleged.

WILL ADMINISTER OATH TO HARDING IN SENATE CHAMBER

Washington, Jan. 11.—President Elect Harding will take the oath of office in the senate chamber and all outside ceremonies planned at the capitol and elsewhere will be abandoned, according to a decision reached Tuesday by the joint congressional inauguration committee.

After considering Senator Harding's request for a simple inaugural the congressional committee cancelled plans for a large reviewing stand and for official invitations.

Florists, it was said, also expected the loss of hundreds of orders.
