But no one knew where her mother lived or what her mother's name was. Besides, there was a man, a sweetheart. He had taught the girl the drug habit. She could never stay away from him. Never! So all the rest of the poor victims say—and I suppose she couldn't.

She didn't want to be "bossed," either—the girl who screamed and cried for her mother in the jail the other day. What would she give to be back in the shelter of that home that was freedom itself, compared to the tyranny she suffers under now!

Rules and regulations—pride and prejudice—eager youth and settled maturity, and the clash between them—these things are hard to hear, but oh, the anguish that sometimes waits for those who cannot or who will not bear them patiently!

Attempt to Sell Russ Duchess' Gems Lands Man in Jail

New York, Jan. 11.—While attempting to sell a \$50,000 diamond and emerald pendant, which he said was the property of the former Grand Duchess Olga of Russia, Anatole Cambouline, claiming to be a member of Russian nobility, was arrested in Brooklyn Monday.

Cambouline told customs officers he wished to buy food for hundreds of fellow Russian refugees.
The pendant was set with 50 diamonds and two large emeralds.
He was held for investigation in \$5,000 bail, charged with having violated the customs laws by failing to declare the jewel for duty when he entered the country.

One Slain; Another Wounded in Streets of Dublin by Police

Dublin, Jan. 11.—James Farrell was shot dead and Thomas Connolly was severely wounded in North Brunswick street, Dublin, by auxiliary police Monday night. Children playing in the street were the only witnesses.
A semi-official report says that while two auxiliary police officers were walking through the streets several shots were fired at them, whereupon one of the officers returned the fire.

New Indictments to Result From Indiana Coal Quiz

Indianapolis, Jan. 11.—New indictments and additional defendant probably will result from the federal grand jury's reopening of the investigation of the coal conspiracy cases against 125 men, Ohio and western Pennsylvania, operators and miners in Indiana. District Attorney Fredrick VanNuy, Monday, informed Judge A. B. Anderson, who postponed indefinitely the trials of those now under indictment.
The postponement was asked by Mr. VanNuy, who said he wished to complete other inquiries before the grand jury, before renewing the coal investigation.

Persia Evacuation by British Ordered

London, Jan. 11.—The British legation in Teheran, Persia, has ordered the immediate evacuation by British women and children of Persia, in view of the announced withdrawal of the British forces in northwest Persia and its threatened sequel, a bolshevik invasion, says a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Teheran.
The dispatch adds that all the foreign legations and nationals and the Persia, who with his court, will leave Teheran in the spring.

Mines Co. Doctor Is Victim of Typhus

New York, Jan. 11.—The death in Bolivia of Dr. Fred W. Eastman of Lees Summit, Mo., physician in charge of medical corps attached to the Guggenheim Brothers mining forces there, was announced here Tuesday. Reports indicate his death January 5 or 6 resulted from typhus but it was said official confirmation has not been received.

ASCEND MOUNT EVEREST AIM OF BRITISH CLIMBER
London, Jan. 10.—At a meeting of the Royal Geographical Society Tuesday night Sir Francis Younghusband, the traveler and explorer, announced that the Tibetan government having granted permission, an attempt would be made next year to climb Mount Everest, the highest known peak in the world.

NOT HIS WIFE BUT USED HIS CREDIT

Mrs. Edith Compton Had Authority, Railroad Man Tells Justice Court.

Mrs. Edith Compton, arrested last week on the charge that she had obtained merchandise from the Noble Mercantile company through false representation was acquitted Tuesday by Justice of the Peace P. J. Shields after he had heard the evidence. Testimony introduced by the prosecution was that Mrs. Compton obtained \$3 credit at the store by representing that she was Mrs. P. A. Hoyem, wife of a Great Northern railroad man, but the defendant asserted that she had only told the management that she desired to obtain credit in Mr. Hoyem's name.
Hoyem was called as a witness, and told the court that he had authorized Mrs. Compton to open a charge account in his name. There is now alleged to be \$61.67 due on the account, which originally was for a larger amount. Mrs. Compton has made several payments on the debt and a suit is said to be now pending against Hoyem in which recovery of the account is sought.

Denies Japanese Planning Colony Along Rio Grande

San Antonio, Texas, Jan. 11.—Denying that the presence of two Japanese families at Harlingen, in the lower Rio Grande valley, is a forerunner of an extensive colonization scheme, S. Ishii, representative of Z. Yamada, reputed to be a millionaire of Los Angeles, upon his arrival here tonight, issued a statement saying that if the people of the valley wish to buy the land already sold to eight Japanese families, he will be glad to act as their agent in the matter.
He said the total holding of the Japanese in the valley is 253 acres, all of which was sold to Japanese farmers by Mr. Yamada, following a visit to Harlingen.

Anatole France Joins Communists

Paris, Jan. 11.—Anatole France, the author, has announced his adhesion to the communist section of the French socialist party. This action was not unexpected, as he began last October to write articles favoring soviet principles and the advancement of soviet principles was one of the principal undertakings of his life.

RESTAURANTS AND BAKERIES ARE SANITARY

Food Selling Establishments of Cascade County Are All Given Official Approval.

Restaurants, cafes, bakeries, dairies and meat markets in Cascade county during December were found to be in good sanitary condition when inspected by Sanitary Policeman William Shea according to his report to the city council Tuesday night.
At the single one of the restaurants, cafes, bakeries, dairies or meat markets that did not comply in almost every way with the health regulations. Twenty-three restaurants and cafes were inspected; 21 meat markets, eight bakeries and seven confectionery stores. Two soda fountains, one at Stockton and the other at Cascade, were also inspected by Mr. Shea. Special inspections of 17 other kinds of food were also made during the month.
The general average of the restaurants and cafes was 90.5 per cent; for the meat markets 92.7 per cent; for the bakeries 94.5 per cent, and for the confectionery stores 91.8 per cent.
Four of the restaurants, the Gerald, the Sprag, the Wigwam and the Depot Lunch received a grade of 97 per cent. The highest grade for meat markets was received by the Great Falls Meat company, with 99 per cent. Hughes Brothers and the Quality markets ranked second with 98 per cent, and four others received a grade of 97 per cent.
Special notices for the removal of 131 insanitary nuisances were served by Police Commissioner Shea; 143 houses were quarantined; 109 communicable disease cases released and 17 houses fumigated for scarlet fever and diphtheria.
