

NOVICE YEGGS MAKE TRIP TO BLACK EAGLE

Silk Shirt, Underclothing and Small Jewelry Taken From Two Places.

Burglars believed to be the same who Saturday and Sunday nights entered a dozen Great Falls homes and stole cash, jewelry and a large quantity of groceries transferred their activities to Black Eagle Monday night, ransacked two places and gave over a third attempt when they realized that their movements were observed. From the bachelor's shack of Aaron Bjornson, located at the rear of the postoffice, a gold watch, a gold ring and some underclothing were taken and a silk shirt was stolen from a laborer's boarding shack. No groceries were available at either place.

Seek Edibles and Clothing.
The yeggs at both places entered in Black Eagle followed the same methods reported from the homes looted in Great Falls. The interiors were thoroughly searched for valuables and edibles, and clothing, personal effects and furniture were scattered about the rooms. Entrance was gained to the Bjornson shack by forcing two locks and after entering the yeggs broke open a trunk, where the ring and watch were hidden. Two locks were also forced at the laborer's shack.

The burglars were seen by Mrs. Anton Barsoti at the home of a neighbor who was out of town for the night. When she spoke to them they said they were trying to locate some one who lived in that vicinity and after a moment's conversation walked away. It was not until morning that it was learned they had attempted to force the door. Two screws were taken from the hasp and the lock had been partially filed through, their tools evidently having been too light to remove all of the screws from the hasp.

Gets Partial Description.
Mrs. Barsoti was able to give a partial description of the men. Both, she said, were exceptionally well dressed and one was of medium height and the other quite tall. Sheriff Bob Gordon and Deputy Guy Palagi began a search for the burglars as soon as the thefts were reported, but nothing was found during the day to indicate the identity of the thieves. The burglaries were also reported to the Great Falls police and officers were detailed to help in the search. Chief Marcus Anderson said the work of the burglars in Black Eagle showed the same handiwork as those committed in Great Falls Saturday and Sunday nights.

NO WOMEN ON JURY IN CASCADE COUNTY

Names of Approximately 3,000 Male Tax Payers Put on List for Coming Term.

Trial juries for district court terms called during the next year will be summoned from a list of approximately 3,000 names, it was estimated Tuesday by Chairman B. C. Johnston of the board of county commissioners; Treasurer Fred C. Andretta and Assessor Harold Mady. These officials compose a canvassing board designated by law

to compile the jury list at the first of each year.
The complete jury list will include the names of all male taxpayers in the county, owners of real and personal property having equal rank on the list. The canvassing board stated that there are approximately 3,000 men in Cascade county whose names appear on the tax lists.
