PEACE IN BASEBALL REIGNS WITH LANDIS AS HIGHEST COURT

Ted Morris Is Elected Captain of Secondary Basketball Quintet at High School.

Under the leadership of Ted Morris, his newly elected captain, the Great Falls high school basketball team defeated the Augusta high aggregation.

Enemies Bury Hatchet When New Agreement Is Accepted by Minors and Majors.

Chicago, Nov. 12.—Organized baseball Wednesday swept the last vestige of disagreement from its rank in a series of conferences which brought signed peace agreements not only between the major and minor leagues, but between the minor leagues themselves.

The two major leagues signed the new national agreement making Judge Kenesaw M. Landis baseball commissioner with supreme power and the minor leagues also signed an agreement with Judge Landis as their ruler, but differing in one word that signed by the minors. This difference, it developed, was due to a misunderstanding in the joint meeting of drafting committees when the agreement was drawn up.

It was announced that so soon as the necessary formalities were completed through with the minors would sign an agreement identical with the one approved by the major organizations.

Landis Major Arbitrator. Besides signing the national agreement, the individual major league club owners will have their signatures to a contract in which they agreed not to criticize each other publicly and to accept any decision made by Judge Landis.

Included in the signatories to this agreement were President Byron B. Johnson of the American league, and two of the three club owners who have formed the administration—Charles A. Conroy of Chicago and Jacob Ruppert of New York.

Harry Frazee of Boston, the third club owner who opposed Johnson in recent American league disagreements, was not present. He had previously announced he would sign, but has announced he will sign.

The signing of the new national agreement brought a sharp statement from Judge Landis concerning the powers he must be given as baseball commissioner and led to erroneous reports that he had issued an ultimatum giving the club owners 15 minutes in which to make changes demanded. The judge did not set a time limit, but did issue an ultimatum telling the club owners that his powers must be supreme.

Gets \$42,500 a Year. Wednesday night the major leaguers signed the contract with Judge Landis, which will pay him \$42,500 a year for seven years at \$50,000 a year. The national agreement will remain in effect so long as Judge Landis is commissioner.

Judge Landis, however, has stipulated that his salary of \$75,000 a year as judge should be deducted from his baseball salary, so he actually will be paid only \$42,500 a year for governing the game.

The new agreement also provides for restoration of the draft, with the prices scaled down from \$5,000 for class AA leaguers to \$1,000 for class D. The American association and the new International leagues remained out of the draft, while Pacific coast league,
