Build Ideals in Boys.

"Any idea or ideal that you would have dominate a nation must first lay hold of its boys," declared Mr. Demand in his address to the men's meeting.

"The world is in need of Christian leadership today as it never has been. The millions and millions killed and who died because of the war included the future statesmen, professional and business men of tomorrow. The American boy not only must supply the needed leadership for America but aid greatly in supplying the leadership for the rest of the world."

"There are ten million teen age boys in America. Of these 750,000 are in our high schools but for every boy in high school there are six boys that have dropped out of school and are working. There are 4,640,000 employed boys in America."

"Y" Supplements Either Activities. "The Y. M. C. A. program is not conducted as a substitute but to supplement the fundamental agencies of the community such as the home, the school, the church and municipality."

"Men today the world around are meeting in conventions to discuss the cattle situation, the wool markets and a hundred and one other topics, but how few there are who are taking the time to discuss the needs of the boy life in the community and nation? We should be as interested in the imprint we make on our boy life as we are in the brand we put on our steers."

Boys' Work Planned. "The Great Falls 'Y' boys' division is planning an extension program in co-operation with the organized boys' Sunday school classes, whereby the Boy Scouts or any other organized group, may obtain the advantages of the Y. M. C. A."

Helen Ruybrasky Weds J. Glapiaka


