PRISONERS ADMIT BURGLARIES; SHOW WHERE LOOT WAS HIDDEN

Crane, Dudeck and Gollick Acknowledge to Officials Series of Thefts; Balance of Property Hidden in Shack Ceiling.

Entire responsibility for the recent burglaries in Great Falls was assumed by George Dudeck, John Crane and Anthony Gollick, alias Klise, who were arrested Wednesday by the police in a shack at 519 Eighth avenue south, in statements made Thursday by the prisoners to Deputy County Attorney W. J. Tighe and Chief of Police Marcus Anderson.

Crane, a paroled inmate of the state industrial school, alone burglarized the residence of Rev. D. L. McGuffin and was present when the Armour warehouse was robbed, but Crane and Dudeck declared that he was not implicated in any of the other thefts.

"We will plead guilty to burglary, and the sooner the better," said Crane and Dudeck at the conclusion of their statements.

Cache is Uncovered Acting on information given by the prisoners, Chief Anderson, late in the afternoon, uncovered a cache containing nearly all of the missing property. The prisoners volunteered to take the police to where the stolen property was hidden, and showed the chief where they removed the board from the ceiling and concealed the loot.

They then gave the date of each burglary, described every article taken from each place and declared that none of the property had been sold.

They emphatically denied that they had any knowledge of the robbery of John A. Sohner, a traveling salesman, last Sunday.

Crane was severely beaten by two thugs. The prisoners admitted the two or three burglaries in Black Eagle.

The prisoners made their statements after repeatedly denying that they were in any way connected with the burglaries. Dudeck was first examined and adhered to his denial until he realized the nature of the proof obtained by the police.

Offer to Confess "Bring Crane up and we'll tell everything we know," he finally said. Crane was brought to Chief Anderson's office and waited only long enough to eat that black had decided to make an admission before he joined in the recital.

Their stories were identical with the one told later by Gollick, who had not seen the other prisoners since they were arrested.

Reference was made in the statements to Angelina Ward, the young girl found at the shack Wednesday after the arrest of the three men.

A diamond ring which the girl said was given to her by the men was returned to County Attorney H. G. Bennett Wednesday by her step-father.

By a simultaneous coincidence, Mr. Ward was at Mr. Bennett's office at the time the authorities interfere with the girl's friendship for the men when the following a blind clue, placed Dudeck, Crane and Gollick under arrest.

Mr. Ward said he had taken the ring away from the girl several days before, but that she had refused to say where she got it.

Two Have Police Records According to Inspector R. S. Gaunt, the man Dudeck once served a year in the state penitentiary for an Anacostia burglary, but Crane has no former record.

IRISH SPEAKER ISSUES "DEFI" TO MINISTERS

Great Falls Ministerial Alliance Challenged to Debate Question Sunday.

Challenge to the members of the Great Falls Ministerial Alliance to discuss the question of Irish freedom and "Irish Republic" at the Grand theater Sunday afternoon was issued from the stage of the theater Thursday night by Dr. Edward Adams Cantrell.

Cantrell is a representative of the all-American bureau of speakers for the Irish republic. He was introduced by Emmett Moore, producer of the motion picture film "Ireland a Nation" which was shown at the Grand last night.

Irish Sores Show The evening's program was made up of a series of Irish scenes in motion pictures, a violin solo by Miss Emily O'Loott, a short talk by Mr. Moore and the Irish melodrama on the screen, which showed a series of scenes in Irish history.

The Irish parliament which voted for union with England for governmental purposes constituted the first scene. The love story of Robert Emmett and Sarah Curran furnished the third of the program.

The introduction of Dr. Cantrell was important. He had come to Great Falls to arrange for his meeting at the Grand theater Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock under the sponsorship of the Great Falls council of the American Association of the Recognition of the Irish Republic.

Question Not Religious "The question is not racial, it is not religious," declared Dr. Cantrell, after he had been called to the stage by Mr. Moore. "It is the struggle of the church of England to have a petition for the withdrawal of British troops from Ireland is indicative of the question."

"I do not wish to see the protestant ministers or the protestant people of America maneuvered into a false position in this question."

"I call upon the ministers of this city, who passed resolutions condemning the movement for Irish freedom to reconsider that action, and if they do not I am going to ask them to come on the stage and sign the following argument against Irish freedom: I want to hear it and I want you to hear it."

NEW COUNTY OWES CASCADE \$44,218

Settlement Statement by Commission Needs Only One Signature to Be Complete.

A statement showing that the new county of Judith Basin is in Cascade county's debt to the extent of \$44,218 was received Thursday by B. P. McNair and Rufus Poland, members of the commission appointed to make an adjustment between the two counties.

Mr. Poland and Mr. McNair attached their signatures to the statement and the document will be presented to the county boards of the two counties as soon as it is signed by Van Housen or Hobson, the other member of the commission. Mr. Benouch was not in Great Falls when the statement was made ready for the signatures.

The amount owing to Cascade county is small as compared with the new county's obligation to Fergus county from which the greater portion of its territory was acquired. The statement shows that Fergus county will receive \$291,167.23 from its offspring. A detailed announcement of the settlement will not be made until the commission finally winds up its business.

The new county has the option of discharging its debt to the old counties now by floating a bond issue, or of paying the amount in three annual installments.

Complaint was filed against him in the Wilson justice court at the same time Ben Weldon, also of Simms, was accused of an identical offense, but was not found until after Weldon had been released under \$500 bail.

BLACK EAGLE MAN GONE FOR 4 DAYS

Friends of Gino Cicotini Fear He Met With Violence or Is a Suicide.

Foul play or suicide is believed to be responsible for the disappearance of Black Eagle of Gino Cicotini, aged 30, an Italian smelter worker, who mysteriously dropped out of sight four days ago.

Friends of the missing man notified Deputy Sheriff Guy Palangi Thursday of his disappearance and a search was immediately begun that was without success up to late in the evening.

Deputy Palangi was told that Cicotini had shown evidence of melancholia for several days prior to his disappearance, which causes the theory of suicide to be especially entertained.

Cicotini had said at his boarding house that he was worried because of lack of funds, and refused to be cheered with the promise that his landlord would always see that he had enough to eat. He disappeared a short time after he had spoken of his troubles and has not since been seen.

RYAN COMPANY BUYS BUSINESS OF KEIL BROS.

Hundred Thousand Dollars Paid by Wholesale Grocers for Billings Concern.

For consideration of about \$100,000 a deal was completed Friday by W. M. Fergus of Great Falls, manager of the Ryan wholesale grocery houses at Great Falls, Havre and Billings, whereby the wholesale grocery stock of Keil Brothers at Billings will be transferred to the Ryan grocery house in the Yegen block at Billings.

Keil Brothers will retain all furniture, fixtures and book accounts and will continue their coffee roasting and manufacturing interests in their present location.

This transaction, according to Mr. Fergus, denotes Mr. Ryan's confidence in Montana's future. A short time ago Mr. Ryan authorized an increase of the capital stock of the Ryan Grocery Co. at Billings from \$200,000 to \$500,000.

George W. Ryan has been a resident of Great Falls since the arrival of the Great Northern railway and only now makes his home in California on account of ill health.

In October, 1914, Mr. Ryan purchased the Yegen Brothers' wholesale house and retained W. M. Fergus, who was then manager for Yegen Brothers, as manager for his wholesale firm. Mr. Fergus moved to Great Falls in 1916 and in 1917 the Ryan Havre Co. was incorporated, for which Mr. Ryan built one of the best wholesale grocery buildings in the state at Havre. The building is built of brick and has two stories and a basement. It is 90x100 feet.

Mr. Fergus, who is now at Billings, is expected to return in a few days.
