
Two Battlers Barred From Kentucky Ring on Stalling Charge

Jewtraw and Moore Tie in Ice Racing Championship Events

Lake Placid, N. Y., Feb. 10.—Charles Jewtraw, of Lake Placid and Joe Moore, of New York City, tied for honors Thursday at the opening here of the international ice skating championships. Jewtraw won the 220 race, an inch or so ahead of Charles Gorman, and Moore took the mile race after Jewtraw had fallen over George Thompson, of Chicago, who fell directly in his path.

Thirty points each were accorded to Jewtraw and Moore. The highest number of points awarded to any individual went to Miss Gladys Robinson, of Toronto, who finished with 90. She won the women's events in both the 100 yard dash and the half mile, defeating Miss Rose Johnson, of Chicago, present holder of the women's international championship.

Cases of Whisky Hidden Under Oats Found by U. S. Men

Sixty-six cases of Canadian whisky were discovered in a car of oats at Eastport, Idaho, last week and seized by federal customs officials, it was reported Thursday by A. J. King, collector of customs for the port of Great Falls. The liquor had been placed in sacks and buried under the oats, and was discovered just after crossing into Idaho. The seizure was made by Clark Collins and Spencer Lewis, deputy customs collectors, and was stored at Bonners Ferry pending receipt of a court order. The shipment was not accompanied by the owner and no information has been obtained as to the identity of persons responsible for its presence in the oats.

Registered Pigeons May Be Shot at All Regular Trap Shoots

Trapshooters may now hold regular clay bird shoots at any regular club trap shoot, according to W. R. Wilcoxson, president of the Great Falls Rod and Gun club, who has just received word of a ruling of the American Trapshooting association, making it possible for clubs to shoot registered pigeons at any regular club shoot instead of at tournaments only as before.

Driven From Gotham, Crooks Seek Safety in Great Britain

Southampton, Eng.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Criminals driven out of New York by the efforts to suppress the crime wave there are fleeing to England as stowaways on British ships, say the British mariners. One captain told a magistrate here that stowaways had been discovered on board every Cunard ship that sailed from New York for England for the last three months. HISTORIC FIGURE IN BASEBALL PUT ON RETIRED LIST

Frank C. Bancroft, for 30 Years Business Manager of Reds Pioneer of Game.

Cincinnati, O., Feb. 10.—When Frank C. Bancroft, for 30 years business manager of the Cincinnati National league baseball club, was succeeded in that position recently by Frank Behle, an attaché of the probate court of this city, one of the most picturesque figures that baseball ever produced passed from the national game. Bancroft is ill with neuritis but he has been assured by President Harry Herrmann, of the club, that his salary will go on just the same. He became interested in baseball within a few years after the close of the Civil War in which he served as a drummer boy with a New England regiment.

Developed Two Stars.

He saw the possibilities in the professional angle of the game around 1874 when he became identified with the New Bedford team. Later, he joined the Worcester team. More than 40 years ago he developed two men whose names will live forever in the annals of the game—Harry Stover, king of base runners for all time and Lee Richmond, perhaps the greatest left handed pitcher of the game. In all baseball history there have been eight games pitched where no man reached first base against the winning pitcher and in less than two years' time, Richmond pitched two of these contests.

In 1884, Bancroft managed the famous old Providence team that participated in the first world series. He piloted the team through the immortal campaign when Charles "Old Hoss" Radbourne made the pitching record that may never be equaled. "Banny's" team won the world's championship banner that year.

With Reds Since 1891.

In 1891 Bancroft appeared in Cincinnati as manager of Mike Kelly's Players League aggregation and he remained after "Kelly's Killers" had gone. He was engaged by the late John T. Brush, then president of the Cincinnati club, to handle the business affairs of the club. In the generation that followed Bancroft became one of the most notable of baseball figures. He plotted the Reds everywhere, arranged their training tours, took them barnstorming in the fall and between times took clubs to Cuba, Hawaii and California. In Cuba he is known as "The Father of Baseball" as it was he who took the first team of professional players to the island. He is now 76 years old.
