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WOMEN OF BORNEO ESPOUSING CAUSE OF EQUAL SUFFRAGE

"Terrible Dyaks" Quit Playful Pastime of Man-Hunting for Modern Theories.

Amsterdam.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Women's suffrage movements of the natives the Dutch East Indies, the colonies whose history and ancient savagery were chiefly known to credulous Americans through the agency of circus side shows, wherein the "Wild Man of Borneo" and "The Terrible Dyaks, Ferocious Head Hunting Cannibals," drew many dimes while the crowds waited for the "big tent" to open.

Head hunting and kindred savage pastimes still continue to some extent, within the jungles of these Dutch islands, but, according to the Dutch press, most of the natives are rapidly adopting modern theories. In Java, the upper class native women, under the leadership of Radeo Adjing Kartini, a woman of high birth, are reported to be making rapid strides toward emancipation, although the Mohammedan custom of polygamy still prevails. In all the "Kartini Schools," the girls of the upper classes are being taught occidental theories of equality with the men. Dutch correspondents say the progress of the movement is necessarily slow but appears to be certain of ultimate success.
