

### NEW DIRECTORS TO BE NAMED IN DISTRICT NO. 1

Election Will Be April 2; Nominations for Three Offices by Mass Meeting.

Three school directors will be elected by School district No. 1, which comprises Great Falls, Black Eagle and other adjacent territory outside Great Falls city limits, April 2. Registration books for the school district closed last Tuesday, with few more names than those left last November after non-voters had been stricken from the list.

Three trustees whose terms of office will expire are H. B. Noble, H. H. Swain and W. T. Burns. The hold over members are J. W. Roberts, C. D. Elliot, H. H. Stanley and Fred Lampen. Nomination of candidates is by mass meeting, which can be called by any tax payer at any time during March. There is no limit to the number of candidates who may be nominated at this meeting.

### TO ENABLE EX-SOLDIER TO GET OUT AND ENJOY SUNNY DAYS AT HOSPITAL, CRUTCHES ARE SOUGHT BY RED CROSS

If Gilbert Anderson, a world war veteran, who is a patient at the Deaconess hospital, had a pair of crutches he could get outdoors on fine spring days.

Anderson is now confined to a wheelchair. He was operated on at the hospital some weeks ago. As a soldier in France he was wounded while fighting on the Argonne front. Later he was taken prisoner by the Germans and spent some time in a German prison camp. After his discharge he returned to his home on a farm near Great Falls expecting to recover from the wound, but his condition did not improve. Since his return he has been unable to do any work. Therefore he came to the hospital seeking surgical relief, which he obtained through the aid of the Red Cross.

There is another ex-soldier at the hospital who could get out-of-doors without any crutches if he only had a cane. A letter was received recently in the home service office of the Red Cross from Miss M. L. Thome of Phillipsburg, N. J., asking for the names of some of the dry land farmers in Montana whom the Red Cross is supplying with magazines. Miss

Thome had read an appeal in the pages of the Great Falls Tribune for magazines to be sent into the drouth regions and said she would be glad to send her magazines directly to drouth sufferers as soon as she had finished reading them.

### PUREBRED HOGS ARE AUCTIONED AT LOW PRICES

Top Price for Duroc Jersey at Pavilion Sale Is \$165; Buyers Are Many.

Fifty-five head of purebred Duroc Jersey swine were sold at an average price of \$48 each, Wednesday afternoon at the livestock pavilion, in the first sale of purebred hogs ever held in northern Montana, as well as the first sale of the kind ever held in the new pavilion. Sixty animals were put up for auction by Otto Maurer of Highwood who offered 40 hogs, and by A. B. McVay of Great Falls, who offered 20.

The prices were bargain figures, although a large number of buyers were present from out of town and bidding was lively within the price limit. Top price was \$165 paid by M. Proctor, Mont., for a gilt farrowed March 5, 1920. The next best figure for a single animal was \$80, which was paid by Mr. Proctor for a second gilt, and by C. N. Fairbanks of Buffalo, Mont., for Topsy 728188. Among the larger buyers were Mr.

Proctor, Mr. Fairbanks, Joe Bernasek of Great Falls and Bert McCullom of Carter. Other buyers were L. G. Fasmore of Farmington, Charles Dyar of Cascade, E. G. Olmstead of Genou, Julius Golding of Great Falls, Henry George of Great Falls, the Lost Lake Livestock Co. of Great Falls, Shelton McKenzie of Fort Benton, Arthur Thompson of Great Falls, the Stranahan Livestock Co. of Fort Benton, E. ### Diphtheria Bacteria Carriers Quarantined

Two children on the west side were quarantined Wednesday as the result of throat cultures taken from the eighth grade school children at the Franklin school Monday. These children were quarantined as carriers of the diphtheria germ. Although they themselves are not ill with this disease they have the germ in their throats and are capable of giving it to other children. As soon as the germs have been removed and all danger of spreading the disease is over they will be permitted to return to school. This may be only a matter of a few days.

### LIGHT FINE GIVEN TO BILLINGS MAN

Phil Laux of Billings pleaded guilty in federal court Wednesday to transporting whisky at Billings and was fined \$1 and costs. Laux had formerly been tried and convicted in the Billings court on a charge of selling whisky in violation of the national prohibition act. His fine at that time was \$100 and 10 days in jail. The court held that the charge brought against him at this time was virtually the same as the one of which he was convicted at Billings and therefore the fine imposed Wednesday was a light one.

Frances Thorenson, who was tried during the December term of court at Great Falls on a charge of using the mails to defraud mail order houses, was fined \$200 and costs Wednesday by Judge George M. Bourquin. She was given 30 days in which to pay the fine.

Petition for a new trial of the case of T. I. Vanatta against the Montana National bank was presented Wednesday and later was taken under advisement. The case was tried in the court last December and at that time the decision was rendered in favor of the Montana National bank.

A motion for a new trial for I. O. Slette, who was tried and convicted last November for transporting liquor

on the Fort Peck Indian reservation, was denied. Ten informations against various persons in the state for violation of the national prohibition act were filed Wednesday by United States District Attorney George F. Shelton.


