## LAST SAD RITES CONDUCTED FOR HIRAM WALKER

Twenty-One Cases of Seized Liquor Destroyed; U. S. Authorities Get Car.

With a book of Montana codes serving as the only ritual and with full observance of ceremonies prescribed in a district court forfeiture order, there was dumped in a Great Falls sewer Monday the 21 cases of Hiram Walker whisky seized nearly a month ago by Sheriff Bob Gordon while it was in transit from Canada to the location of a joint fraternal convention.

No claimant appeared at the hearing held to determine whether the liquor should be destroyed and required proof of ownership has not been obtained against any individual, but the destination of the cargo and the reason for its importation became known through a Butte delegation who following the seizure, made a sorrowful pilgrimage to Great Falls, and as sorrowfully returned.

Quite noncommittally they inquired into Sheriff Gordon's notion of the fitness of things, and learned that his ideas were very fixed. A short time after showing that the court's order for the destruction of the whisky had been observed.

The Reo automobile seized at Ulm with the whisky has been taken in charge by federal officers and its disposition will be determined in federal court. Suit was brought by the Montana Cadillac company last week to recover the car from Sheriff Gordon through a repossession machine from falling into the hands of the federal. The car is valued at \$600.

The John Irvine and George Ottot whisky stills, seized several weeks ago by Sheriff Gordon, were ordered destroyed Monday by the district court. Irvine and Ottot are both serving 90-day jail sentences and each will pay a fine of \$200.

Report of the city police commission's findings on the charge preferred against Policeman Tyrus Sappington will be delayed until the return of Mayor Louis Newman, who is now in Seattle. The report was to have been announced Monday, but since the commission's findings will be filed with the mayor direct, a delay became necessary.

The policeman was tried last week on the charge that he had neglected his duties while assigned to patrol the north side residence district during the recent series of burglaries.

## DAN TRACY NAMED ON MONTANA BOARD FOR IRISH RELIEF

William Scallon of Helena Announces Members of State Executive Committee.

Helena, Feb. 21.—Attorney William Scallon, of Helena, Monday announced the personnel of the state executive committee for the American Committee for relief in Ireland, of which Cornelius F. Kelley, of Butte, is director for Montana.

Mr. Scallon in the course of an interview stated that this work is purely humanitarian and has no reference to the political phase of the Irish troubles. Many thousands of people are in want in Ireland and they will be relieved, regardless of religion or politics, by the American committee.

Mr. Scallon announced that T. A. Marlow, the Helena banker, has consented to act as state treasurer of the movement. R. R. Kilroy, of Butte, has been appointed chairman of the state committee on publicity. The executive committee for Montana, as given out by Mr. Scallon follows:

William Scallon, Helena, chairman; Daniel Tracy, Great Falls; Senator Harry A. Galloway, Butte; W. M. Murphy, Missoula; Senator J. C. McCarthy, Bonanza.

The state organization was formed at a meeting held in Butte several days ago. Organization in eleven of the counties is now being perfected.

## MUST TRY CASE THIS TERM OR NEVER, RULING

Federal Judge Threatens to Dismiss Often Postponed Action From Calendar.

By a ruling of Federal Judge George M. Bourquin Monday, the case of the State Bank of Halstead against K. O. Slette be not tried during the present term, it will be dismissed from the calendar. The case is an old one, having been on the calendar for the last three years, but during all that time has never been brought up for trial. The defendant in the action presented a motion in court Monday to have the case dismissed for want of prosecution but the motion was resisted by the plaintiff. Suit was brought by the defendant and the bank has never asked to have the case set for trial.

Gerald S. Frary appeared in court as attorney for Frank Kepel and asked that a writ of habeas corpus be granted. The writ was denied. Kepel was placed in jail at Havre by the United States commissioner of that town wanted to answer a charge of violation of provincial prohibition act. John A. Fox of Highwood appeared in court Monday morning and entered a plea of "not guilty" to a charge of manufacturing whisky. The case will be set for trial later.
