

FINANCIAL. New York, March 4.—Business on the stock exchange today was overshadowed almost from the outset by the inaugural ceremony in Washington.

Excerpts of President Harding's address were issued by the news tickers during the intermediate period of the trading. The views of the new chief executive regarding the country's abnormal expenditures, readjustments of war taxes and adequate credits struck a responsive chord in the financial district.

Other developments included advice from the Pittsburgh district indicating a further let down of operations in the steel industry, an advance in oil prices on the Pacific coast, and the firmness of American grain.

Mr. Wilson's share in the inauguration ceremonies remained in doubt to the last. It was not until he had finished the business that called him to the capital that he had accompanied him.

Harding Most Courteous. From the moment he emerged from the White House to mount first to the rear seat of the automobile that carried them to the capitol, Mr. Wilson was shown the utmost courtesy.

At the capitol, the car drew up first at the senate wing entrance under the great steps that sweep up to the main floor.

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HATED OF FRANCE BY GERMAN FEARED AS NEW WAR CAUSE

Berlin.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Recurrence of the war spirit of the German people, which even as late as six months ago had been completely banished, recently has assumed a new and noticeable aspect.

Civilians and former soldiers alike frankly express the most intense hatred for the French and again are dreaming of a day when they can even up in war what they have lost in peace.

England on the whole has been credited with a desire for fair play in the execution of the peace treaty, but in many sources the opinion prevails that France is destined to have her way.

Agitation in certain French circles for an independent south Germany, probably under the dominion of Bavaria; the alleged pro-Polish attitude of the French military in Upper Silesian zone; the insistence of the French to have uniformed and armed "protective organizations" shall at once disarm; threats of a military occupation of the Ruhr district; and use of French negro troops in the occupied zone, all have contributed to this revival of race hatred.

Delivery of milk cows to the French has, in view of the milk shortage in Germany and the increase in infant mortality, intensified the feeling among the civilian population against the French people.

A German government official with whom the correspondent discussed the situation did not agree with some men who once held high commissions in the army, that "another struggle with France is inevitable" but expressed the opinion that "hatred of the French is a natural consequence of French conduct."

Dr. Yen, China's foreign minister, has informed the Japanese that the Chinese refugees "were regarded as having committed criminal as well as political offenses," but the Japanese minister, Mr. Obata, replied that a criminal charge makes no difference as the Japanese are not entering the capitol in the same way since his illness.
