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**FUTURE WORK IS PLANNED BY WOODMEN CAMP**

Entertainment on March 15 Is Discussed; Further Plans Laid for Temple.

Plans for the future work of Great Falls Camp No. 37, of the Woodmen of the World occupied most of the time at the regular meeting of the camp last Tuesday night at the Knights of Pythias hall. Much of the time was devoted to planning a social session March 15, for the members of the Woodmen of the World and the Neighbors of Woodcraft.

As the program stands, the Woodmen will meet at 7:30 o'clock for the transaction of routine business of the camp's semi-monthly session, then will adjourn for the joint entertainment which will be a progressive card party and a basket social.

Others co-operating. In this event the Woodmen have the co-operation of Silver Leaf Circle No. 35, and Great Falls Circle No. 184, Neighbors of Woodcraft. Committees are arranging for the affair, which is expected to bring out a record crowd of Woodmen and the Women of Woodcraft.

There was little business above the usual routine in the meeting last Tuesday, though the camp acted on the usual number of applications from prospective Woodmen. Interest in the progress of the campaign for the Woodmen of the World temple continues to find expression in the lodge meetings. The first phase of the campaign has for its keynote "Every Member a Stockholder," and the responses to the circular letter inviting each of the 750 members to participate in the movement to erect a temple in Great Falls leads the directors of the temple association to believe that it will be realized.

All To Buy Stock. While each member is being urged to enter his subscription for as many shares of stock as he feels he can handle, particular emphasis is being laid on the desire to have each member, no matter for how many shares he signs, take up and pay for one share of stock at \$10 within the next 60 days. This will raise enough money to pay off the remaining obligation for the building site on 512 First avenue north, and will provide a fund with which the temple association can go ahead with plans for the construction of the building.

Will Change By-Laws. Changes in the by-laws of the Great Falls Camp No. 37 are now in the making, to permit its easy government no matter how large the membership becomes. Under the old by-laws, which were suitable for a small camp, it was found that there were inconsistencies and unnecessary restrictions when applied to a camp which is now climbing toward the 1000 membership mark. Some of these amendments were reported and discussed at the meeting on last Tuesday night.

A meeting of all ex-service men disabled in the world war will be held at Veterans' hall this (Monday) evening to discuss the formation of a council of "The Disabled American Veterans of the World War in Great Falls. All men eligible to vocational training for disabilities will be eligible to the council, which will be a branch of the national organization recently formed. The meeting has been called by H. M. Daley. There are about 100 veterans here eligible, according to Mr. Daley. Mrs. Jean Morris Ellis, vocational guidance expert for the National War Work council of the Y. M. C. A., will address the men on the selection of vocational courses suitable to them.

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
