

SCANDALS INDICATE BALL FOLKS SHARE HUMAN FRAILTIES

Barring Indicted Players From Game Beats Jail Sentence Says Sanborn.

Chicago, March 26.—Speaking of the honesty of baseball, as nearly every body is doing just now, where did the idea originate that baseball players and promoters were any different from the rest of the human race?

For years there was a tendency among rooters to put the ball player on a high pedestal and idolize and idealize him as a sort of super forty-two or forty-six, according to his chest expansion, immaculate, impersonal, and irreproachable.

All that the world's series scandal of 1919 and the lesser scandals that have followed it, clung to the baseball player, was due to the fact that ball players average up just like those engaged in any other business or profession.

Happens in Every Profession. Every depositor in the United States does not start a run on his bank every time some trusted employe of such an institution is discovered to be an embezzler.

All the newspaper readers in the world do not brand every newspaper man a crook because a few of them have written stories which they knew to be untrue.

Why make baseball players any exception to the average run of humanity?

Baseball has an advantage over every other business or profession in that the individual crook is powerless to do any cheating.

He must have assistance, as was proven when one of the White Sox players confessed that the whole right of them, who were in fact conspirators to throw the world's series of 1919, could not deliver the goods in one of the games.

Five of the eight culprits took part in that game, but the other four participants were not on the field, and the game which was supposed to go to Cincinnati.

Ridding Game of Suspects. The problem that confronts the men who are interested in professional baseball now is to rid the sport of all players against whom there is a reasonable doubt of their honesty.

Even if that does not mean every man who would accept a bribe for throwing a game or series it will make it practically impossible for him to cheat, just as the precautions taken by banks and bank examiners make the national banks of this nation the next thing to Gibraltar in the matter of safety.

It is of secondary importance whether or not the ball players who have been "caught with the goods" are sent out of the penitentiary. If they are kept out of baseball it will be a greater punishment and equally satisfactory to the general public.

Must Eliminate Gambling. And the elimination of dishonest players is secondary in importance to divorcing the gambler from the game.

The promoters are looking optimistically forward to a prosperous season. They may be merely whistling to keep up their courage.

A few more weeks will tell, but the best way to insure a retention of the confidence of the public in the honesty of professional baseball is for all the promoters, players, and others vitally interested in the vitality of the sport to combine in an endeavor to squelch the gambler, to discourage even the average fan who cannot get a thrill out of the game unless he has a bet on its result, and to work for laws to suppress the baseball pools.

If there are any club owners in major or minor leagues who will not join hands with the associated in the game to accomplish that end, that club owner should be eliminated, too.

Game on Trial This Year. Baseball is on trial this year, and "1921 will reward fighters." It is up to the promoters of the nation's passion that reward by fighting the gambler.

All yards and alleys must be cleaned of garbage and ashes during this week. Housewives are asked to make a thorough cleaning of their attics and basements, piling all refuse beside the garbage cans in the alley where it will be collected by the garbage department and hauled away.

Boy Scouts to Help. Sanitary policeman William Shea has secured the cooperation of the Commercial club and Rotary clubs which are promoting this movement. The Boy Scouts have been asked to aid in the campaign and the various troops will be assigned to different parts of the city to supervise and help in the cleaning of alleys and yards.

A final inspection will be made at the end of the week by the mayor, the sanitary policeman and the local council of the Boy Scouts and a prize will be awarded to the troop whose district is judged the cleanest.
