WORLD AD CLUB VICE PRESIDENT TO TALK FRIDAY

F. D. Zimmerman Will Make Address to Luncheon of Advertising Men Here.

F. D. Zimmerman, vice president of the Associated Advertisers of the World and publicity and advertising manager of the Continental Oil Co., arrived in Great Falls Tuesday to

He will speak at the annual conference of all salesmen of the Continental Co., and at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Great Falls Advertising club, Friday. Mr. Zimmerman is scheduled to address salesmen of the concern during the four-day session on advertising and publicity work in relation to the promotion of the company's interests in Montana.

Publicity Man Recognized. "Publicity work has changed greatly in my 25 years' experience in the game," said Mr. Zimmerman yesterday. "I remember the time when the publicity and advertising man was looked upon as one to keep clean of, but during the past ten years the profession of bringing to the attention of the public the undertakings, projects and developments of the country's industries has been recognized in all communities."

"Every large industry is now employing a staff of trained writers and observers to make known through the press and other advertising mediums the quality of its products. The publicity man was used during the late war in spreading propaganda and stirring up patriotism in written appeals. But for this method of reaching each individual the response would not have been as great as it was."

Mr. Zimmerman is stopping at the Park hotel during his stay in Great Falls and will leave after the conference for the south.

Jones' Resignation Accepted at Glasgow

Special to The Tribune. Glasgow, March 29.—At a meeting of the board of directors of the Glasgow chamber of commerce Friday, the resignation of Secretary L. E. Jones was accepted. Mr. Jones will leave Glasgow April 10 for Great Falls where he will become secretary of the commercial club. A number of applications were filed with the board for secretary of the Glasgow club, but the board took no action at this meeting, except to instruct the assistant secretary to handle the affairs of the organization temporarily. It was decided to move from the present quarters in the Rundle building into the Goodkind block on April 1. The program of work for 1921 by the chamber of commerce is a constructive one and the members are looking towards a successful year for the organization.

ASKS DRAINAGE TO BE PUT OFF OTHER CHARGES

U. S. Project Engineer Sanford Makes Argument to Sun River Land Owners.

That formation of a drainage district on the Fort Shaw unit of the Sun River irrigation project will enable water users to defer payment of \$46,500 charged against irrigation costs and distribute it over a larger period is basis of an argument prepared for the benefit of land holders on Sun River irrigation project by George O. Sanford, project engineer. The proposed drainage system would drain water from about 2500 acres of seepage area, but each of the land holders on the entire 14,000 acres irrigated would be required to join in defraying the cost of the drainage work.

\$46,500 To Be Paid. The argument prepared by Mr. Sanford says: "The deficit in the O. & M. account amounting to \$34,535, must be paid. If the drainage contract is not executed payment on this deficit must be made at once at not less than 50 cents an acre a year. In addition there is extra work to be done on the canal system estimated to cost \$12,000. This must be paid back as fast as the work

is done. Thus the water users will be required to pay within the next six years about \$46,500, in addition to the regular maintenance charges.

"If the drainage contract be executed, however, the payment of this sum will be deferred in virtually all cases until 1934, and will then be spread over a period of about 10 years. The difference in the average dates of payment will be 14 years.

All Owners To Be Benefited. "The man who has no seepage on his farm will be benefited because the drainage will add area to the acreage over which the cost of the O. & M. can be divided, reducing the acreage per acre.

"If the seeped areas were now in a productive condition and all the private lands paying charges the flat charge this year would be about \$1.85 instead of \$2.50. Assuming that the cost of maintaining the drainage system will be 15 cents an acre there would be a saving on such farms of 60 cents an acre. A payment of 50 cents an acre a year continued for 14 years at 10 per cent compound interest would amount to \$14, which is 67 per cent of the total amount to be paid.

"The reduction in the cost per acre would continue as long as the project operates. "Another point important to the Sun River valley would be the immediate benefit to be derived from an expenditure of \$250,000 for construction of the drainage works, most of which would go for labor."

The organization, when fully organized, will co-operate with local automobile clubs in road work relative to the automobile industry in the state.
