GRAIN AND PROVISIONS. Chicago, April 8.—Wheat prices turned downward today, influenced to a considerable extent by disturbed labor conditions in Great Britain and by gossip that exporters on the American side of the Atlantic were offering to re-sell. The market closed nervous. 1 cent to 2 1/2 cents net lower, with March 1 1/4 to 1 3/4, and July 1 1/4 to 1 1/2. Corn 1/4 to 1/2 cent to 1/2 cent. Oats 1/4 to 1/2 cent to 1/2 cent, and provisions 1/4 to 1/2 cent.

New York Market

FINANCIAL. New York, April 8.—The stock market was extremely lethargic and moderately heavy today, directly attributable to higher money rates and increasing apprehension in connection with the British industrial situation. Total transactions of 360,000 shares consisted largely of the usual speculative issues at recessions of one to three points.
