AID IRRIGATION AND LIVESTOCK INDUSTRY, PLAN

Directors of Montana Development Association Here to Discuss Year's Program.

Directors of the Montana Development association, an organization comprising about 4,000 business men and farmers throughout the state, will plan for the work of the coming year in the development of the state at a two days' session which will open this (Monday) morning at the Hotel Rainbow.

The discussion of irrigation and plans for the advancement of irrigation projects throughout the state to aid the agricultural interests will occupy a large part of the meeting time. C. W. Fowler, Billings, secretary of the organization, said Sunday.

Plan Farm Loans. It is also probable, Mr. Fowler said, that the association will take steps toward the formation of mutual farm loan associations and mutual livestock loan associations to aid farmers in need of money to finance agricultural work.

These loan associations, if formed will be modeled on the building and loan association plan, requiring everyone desiring loans to take stock in the association. The chief aim of the livestock loan association will be the development of a higher quality of stock by furnishing money for the importation of pedigreed breeding stock.

Other problems facing the state will also be discussed by the directors and plans offered for their solution wherever possible.

The plat of First addition to the townsite of Tracy, Cascade county, Montana, having been heretofore filed in the office of the county clerk and recorder of Cascade county, Montana, and a petition having been filed with this board upon the 26th day of January, 1921, by the persons holding all of the real estate occupied by the said townsite to vacate the lot, streets, alleys and boulevards in said townsite; and it appearing to the board that said townsite is situated on lands owned by postoffice, store or other business house, and that the lands upon which the same is situated are owned by the two persons filing the petition, and that good cause exists therefor.

Now, Therefore, It is hereby ordered that the First addition to the townsite of Tracy, Cascade county, Montana, according to the map or plat thereof on file and of record in the office of the county clerk and recorder of Cascade county, Montana, and all lots, streets, alleys, parks and boulevards in said townsite be and they are hereby vacated; and it is further ordered that hereby the same be and they are properly shall be by metes and bounds only, and that the same shall be assessed accordingly.

Clerk instructed to file same.

In the matter of the application for federal aid on project No. 10 Sun River road, Commissioner Jesse R. Bennett offered the following resolution, which on second reading and carried was adopted, Commissioner Jesse R. Bennett, Louis H. Kommers and Ben C. Johnston voting Aye. Nays, None.

Whereas, under the provisions of the act approved July 1916, entitled "An act to provide that the United States shall aid the states in the construction of rural post roads for other than mail purposes," known as the federal aid road act, the state of Montana has been appropriated certain funds for the construction of such roads to be expended under the supervision of the state highway commission, subject to the approval of the United States secretary of agriculture or his agents and in accordance with the laws of the state of Montana and regulations of the said secretary of agriculture, and the said state highway commission in reference thereto, and

Whereas, the county of Cascade, Montana, desires to avail itself of the benefits of said act in the construction of a certain road, known as the Sun River road project in manner set forth in a certain map or plat thereof, which said map or plat is on file and of record in the office of the county clerk and recorder of Cascade county, Montana, and

Therefore Be it Resolved, That the said county, through its duly elected, qualified and acting board of county commissioners, do hereby apply to the state highway commission for such federal aid as, together with funds to be appropriated by said county for that purpose, will pay the cost of such project, and

Be it Further Resolved, That said county agree with the state highway commission that in the event of the construction of such project, the portion of the application as set forth in the project statement referred to, it will be the duty of the county to deposit with the state treasurer of the state of Montana the sum of sixty one thousand five hundred and twenty-two dollars, being fifty per cent of the cost of said project as determined by reconstructions estimates, and further that if the sum so set aside or appropriated by said county is not sufficient, with the amount of federal aid to be received, to complete the project according to the approved plans and specifications, said county shall pay the balance of the cost of such project, and

Be it Further Resolved, That the funds so set aside and appropriated for the purpose herein set forth under the supervision and direction of the said state highway commission, shall be held in trust for the purpose herein set forth, and

Be it Further Resolved, That said county agree that it will from time to time, at its own expense, perform such work and make such needed repairs on said road as will at all times maintain the same in a reasonably safe and usable condition, and that the cost of such maintenance shall not be included in the ordinary repairs or reconstruction.

PERMIT. It is hereby ordered that the Montana Power company be, and it is hereby granted permission to cross the highway at Fifteenth street north, on the north bank of the Missouri river, Great Falls, Montana, with its street railway tracks and all the appurtenances, in order to connect with its present track at its junction with said Tenth street project.

FRANCHISE. To Montana Power Company for Use of First Avenue Bridge.

Be it Resolved by the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Cascade, State of Montana, That

Whereas, the County of Cascade has constructed a reinforced concrete bridge across the Missouri river at First avenue north in the city of Great Falls, and under and pursuant to the provisions of act approved by the legislature of Montana, 1917, the Montana Power company, a corporation, has agreed with the board of county commissioners of the county of Cascade, Montana, for the use of said bridge as a part of its street railway system.

Now, Therefore Be it Resolved, That upon the payment to the county treasurer of Cascade county, Montana, for the use of the bridge fund, of the sum of sixty thousand, nine hundred and two and 96-100 dollars (\$60,962.96) which is the sum determined by the board of county commissioners of Cascade county, Montana, to-wit, one-fourth thereof, which the Montana Power company shall pay to the county for the use thereof.

There be and is hereby granted to the Montana Power company, a corporation, its successors and assigns, the right, franchise and privilege to operate and maintain a street railway upon said First avenue north bridge and the approaches thereto, with all of the necessary and convenient appurtenances, and also the right to erect poles, place wires and use and operate all other equipment, maintenance and operation of a complete street railway system upon and across said bridge and the approaches thereto. And also the right to construct and maintain in said bridge conduits and wires for the transmission of electric current, with manholes and other necessary appurtenances for repairing, maintaining and operating said conduits and electric transmission lines.

Be it Further Resolved, That the Montana Power company, a corporation, its successors and assigns, shall be obligated to pay one-fourth (1/4) of the cost of maintaining such bridge during such time as the said bridge shall be used by said railway.

The foregoing resolution was passed and adopted by unanimous vote of all the members of the board of county commissioners of Cascade county, Montana, in regular meeting assembled, this 31st day of March, 1921.

FRANCHISE. from the county of Cascade, state of Montana, to the Montana Power company, for street railway line upon Tenth street north bridge, at Great Falls, Montana.

Be it Resolved by the Board of County Commissioners of Cascade County, Montana, That

Whereas, Cascade county has constructed a reinforced concrete bridge across the Missouri river at Tenth street north in Great Falls, Montana, and the Montana Power company, a corporation, has made application to this board pursuant to an understanding in that behalf regularly had, for the use of said bridge as a part of its street railway system.

Now, Therefore Be it Resolved, That the Montana Power company, its successors and assigns, shall be granted unto the Montana Power company, its successors and assigns, the right, franchise and privilege for a like period of twenty-five (25) years from the date of this resolution, to build, construct, operate and maintain a street railway, with all of the necessary and convenient appurtenances on the Missouri river at Great Falls, Montana, and the approaches thereto, and also the right to erect poles, place wires and use and operate all other equipment, maintenance and operation of a complete street railway system upon and across said bridge and the approaches.

Be it Further Resolved, That there be and is hereby given by the Montana Power company, its successors and assigns, the right, franchise and privilege for a like period of twenty-five (25) years, to construct and maintain in said bridge, conduits and wires for the transmission of electric current, with manholes and other appurtenances necessary or convenient to the construction, maintenance and repair thereof.

Be it Further Resolved, That in consideration of the franchise granted by the Montana Power company, its successors and assigns, shall be and by the acceptance of this franchise it shall be obligated to pay to Cascade county, Montana, one-fourth (1/4) of the cost of maintaining such bridge during the time such bridge shall be used by said railway. The term "cost of maintaining" herein shall be held to mean and refer to the cost of ordinary and usual maintenance and repair such as plankings and replanking, paving or repaving or mending made necessary by ordinary wear and tear, but not to include any failure or destruction of the bridge or any portion thereof.

The foregoing resolution was unanimously adopted by vote of all of the members of the board of county commissioners of Cascade county, Montana, assembled in regular meeting upon the 31st day of March, 1921.


