

MONTANA MAN RETURNS FROM STAY IN PERU

Too Frequent Revolutions Disgust Robert Craig With South America.

Back from O. Henry's land of daily strikes and two-day revolutions, where presidents rule with armed guards and the armies are composed entirely of generals with long flowing gold sashes and tin swords, came Robert Craig, formerly of Great Falls, who spent two years with the Cerro de Pasco Copper Mining Co. near Lima, Peru.

Mr. Craig returned to his native state after a long sojourn as mining engineer with the Peruvian Mining company and will take up permanent residence here. He will be employed with the Northwestern Hardware Co. of Great Falls in the technical mining department.

Revolutions are common occurrences in South American countries," said Mr. Craig, "and during my stay with the Cerro de Pasco company two outbreaks occurred with the overthrow of one president resulting. President Leguia, the present ruler of Peru, gained his position in a very few minutes, when the people tired of their former idol.

"The last revolution when I was there the Chinese population to the extent of 400 new Chinese graves when the roll was taken after the natives were weary of fighting. The strange part of the outbreaks in that country is that when the natives take a notion that a new president will rectify things, and open war on the weakest element—last time it was the Chinese.

"Peruvian conditions may be said to be the best politically and industrially though of any of the countries down there. Chili was in danger of a serious financial crisis last year and the labor conditions there are not favorable."

BUSINESS PLACES TO CLEAN TODAY

Firemen Inspect for Fire Hazard as Part of City's Cleanup Week.

Today (Thursday) will be "down town day" in the cleanup week campaign, when merchants and others in the business and warehouse district will be given opportunity to clean out their basements and have the accumulation removed by the city wagons without charge.

Members of the city fire departments have been inspecting business places for the last 10 days, recommending removal of rubbish and all fire hazards.

Additional men were put at work Wednesday by City Sanitary Commissioner William Shea, and 400 cubic yards of dirt carried to the city dumps in addition to eight hay rack loads of boughs.

Members of the Boy Scout troops of the city are inspecting the residence district of the city and will report to Mr. Shea Friday all householders who have not cleaned up their premises. The territory that has been covered in the first three days of "cleanup week" extends from the river east to the city limits between Sixth alley north and Fifth alley south.

WIFE DECLARES HUSBAND THIEF

James Carlile Made Ranch Rendezvous for Rustlers, She Testifies in Court.

That her husband is a thief and has harbored thieves at his ranch and compelled her to cook for them was the declaration of Mrs. Theresa Carlile on the witness stand at the trial of her suit for divorce against James Carlile, which was begun in Judge J. B. Leslie's department of the district court Wednesday. Mrs. Carlile alleges cruelty, and says she has been caused mental suffering by the character of the men whom her husband allowed to stay at the ranch.

Seven men were named by Mrs. Carlile and her daughter as having been among those whose presence had caused her mental suffering. Both the mother and daughter said they knew different of the men named were thieves because of their own admissions and because they had branded stock not their own. Mrs. Carlile, in answer to a question by J. A. McDonough, counsel for the defense, said she wanted the jury to understand her as testifying that her husband was a thief.

Mrs. Carlile's case is being conducted by S. J. Crowley, and Arthur Jardine is assisting Mr. McDonough.
