CANAL DIGGING TO BE DONE AT 17 CENTS A YD.

Bids for Irrigation District Work Lower Than Those of a Year Ago.

The lowest bid for moving earth-work on the Beave division of the Sun River irrigation project, received by Project Engineer George O. Sanford is 17 cents a cubic yard. This price is in comparison with bids of 30 cents a cubic yard a year ago, although one bid for a small piece of work a year ago was let at 25 cents. The bids, received from 11 contractors, cover removal of 48,000 cubic yards of earth, construction of 350 cubic yards of reinforced concrete and laying 560 linear feet of concrete pipe. The work will water 2,500 acres adjacent to Simms on the north side of the Sun River. J. E. Roberts & Sons of Simms bid 17 cents on two parts of the work and 20 cents on a third. Witke & Beck of Power, Mont., bid 19 1/2 cents a cubic yard for another section of earth removal. For the reinforced concrete work a bid of \$25 a cubic yard was received from Threet Bros., of Lovell, Wyo. Other bidders were the Lewistown Culvert Co., of Lewistown; Wasson, Stout & Wasson of Choteau; Kind and Sweeney of Fairfield; Scott Smith & Co., of Spokane; Jenkins Bros. of Fort Shaw; Hans Martinson of Great Falls; White, Brown & Leahy of Great Falls and Molen & Park of Cascade.

\$25,000 BONUS PROPOSED FOR NEW OIL WELL

Ad Club Will Ask Other Civic Organizations to Aid in Raising Fund.

Proposing that the citizens of Great Falls raise a cash bonus of from \$10,000 to \$15,000 to be donated to the first oil-producing company flowing a 500-barrel well in the oil districts north of the city, Harvey L. Blomquist, secretary of the Great Falls Advertising club addressed members of the local organization at the weekly luncheon meeting held in the parlour of the Hotel Rainbow, Friday.

The motion was indorsed by Charles R. Hansen, president of the association, and a further motion to increase the sum to \$25,000 was made by Ben Cummings. No definite action in the matter was taken during the meeting and the proposition will be submitted to the Great Falls Commercial club and other organizations this week, Charles Hansen announced.

North to Canadian Line. "We are all aware of the great possibilities in the oil fields north of Great Falls," said Mr. Blomquist, "and I propose that the Great Falls citizens get together and raise a cash bonus to be given to the first oil-producing company bringing a substantial supply of petroleum to the surface. A district could be named by the committee in charge of the matter to include all companies in that particular zone. By northern Montana fields I mean the oil centers lying north of this city and bounded by the Canadian line.

To Foster Drilling. "This offer from the city of Great Falls would double the present enthusiasm of the prospectors and when oil is struck in that vicinity, this city will double in record time and the business of the district will greatly increase. I propose this as a means of offering some inducement to the prospectors in this section and if sanctioned by the clubs of the city will surely be repaid ten-fold."

President Charles R. Hansen immediately indorsed the proposition stating that, "I feel that the city of Great Falls is on the eve of great prosperity and Mr. Blomquist's idea will greatly benefit the city if it is passed by other organizations. I will appoint a committee to investigate the possibilities of raising the bonus."

The following oil development committee of five was appointed yesterday by Mr. Hansen to confer with the commercial and financial institutions in Great Falls with regard to launching the campaign to raise the necessary funds: Ben R. Comings; Charles McKinney; R. L. Steel; Maurice Handler and Scott Leavitt.

A meeting of the committee will be called early next week. It was announced yesterday by Hansen and plans for placing the proposition before the commercial and financial element will be discussed and acted upon at the next meeting of the advertising club Friday. A chairman for the committee will be selected shortly, it was announced Friday.

Joint Luncheon Planned. Clarence Conrad, recently elected president of the Merchant's Association of Great Falls, announced during the luncheon that arrangements are being made by both organizations to hold a joint "get-together" luncheon meeting next Friday. Noon luncheons will be held twice monthly by the merchant's association, Mr. Conrad announced.

Prizes for School Essays. Charles Hansen announced, following Mr. Steele's speech, that arrangements would be made by the advertising club to hold school essay contests in all the educational institutions in this city. Prizes will be awarded the winning essayists and the best "boost" letter will be sent to all clubs and organizations in all sections of the United States.

The value of having our school children interested in the possibilities of Great Falls, said Mr. Hansen "will no doubt be shown by the work they will be awarded handsome prizes for the work. We will spare no expense in letting the rest of the nation know that this city and county of ours is unsurpassed in any section of the country."

The following members of the organization were named Friday on the "Is It Good For Great Falls" committee: E. J. Daley; F. J. Perra; W. M. Baldwin; Carl Boorman; L. E. Flint; Charles Hansen; Forrest Arthur. The election of a chairman for the committee will be made at the

next meeting of the committee, it was stated yesterday by Mr. Hansen.

Parra Gives Talk. Fred Parra gave a short talk on "Circulated Advertising" and urged a generalization of sales in all business houses in the city and the elimination of one specific sale. L. E. Jones, recently named secretary of the Great Falls Commercial club, was introduced to the members by Scott Leavitt and made a brief talk on the lines of cooperation and fellowship. The club passed a motion to observe Music week with a special musical program on April 25.

RETURNS TO HELENA. John A. Simon, former deputy collector of internal revenue in Great Falls, returned to the head office in Helena Friday. Mr. Simon will take up permanent residence in the southern city and will be employed as deputy collector of internal revenue. Mr. Simons was in the city for several months aiding the local office during the rush season.
