

SOLEMN REQUIEM MASS FOR THE REPOSE OF THE SOUL OF JAMES CARDINAL GIBBONS IN THE OLD CATHEDRAL WHERE HE LABORED SO LONG

This remarkable photograph was taken by Fred F. Frittita, a staff photographer of The Baltimore News and New York Herald, while the solemn high mass of requiem over the body of James Cardinal Gibbons was being celebrated in the Cathedral at Baltimore. The picture was taken from the lower part of the main aisle looking toward the high altar and shows the catafalque bearing the Cardinal's body, the seminarian choir and

the bishops, archbishops, mitred abbots and monsignori seated on both sides of the catafalque. Most Rev. John Bonzano, Apostolic Delegate, is occupying the pontifical throne, where the late Cardinal Gibbons sat so often. The large figure of Cardinal O'Connell, of Boston, is seen on the left of Monsignor Bonzano's throne, and next to him is the Venerable Cardinal Begin, Primate of Canada.



HAROTOUN TOROSSIAN



Wearing the royal robes which he dons only on state occasions.




A GROUP OF PROMINENT PHYSICIANS
