JUNIORS TAKE LEAD IN INITIAL DAY OF CLASS TRACK MEET

Ten More Track and Field Events Will Be Run Off This Afternoon and Tomorrow.

Sophomores of Great Falls high school piled up a big lead Wednesday afternoon in the first of the three days over which the annual interclass track meet will be spread.

Nine Juniors in the five events run off, captured 35 points, with four firsts and a tie for first in the other event; two seconds and four thirds. Three seniors took seven points, with two seconds and a third, and one sophomore gave his class three points, with second place in the high hurdles.

Gonsler Shows Well
Gonsler, who won the 440 last year at the state interscholastic meet at Missoula in 56 2-5 seconds, swung around the improvised dirt track with three stop watches giving his time as 55 seconds. In the 50 yard dash, which was won at Missoula last year in six seconds flat, Gonsler Wednesday afternoon was caught at 5 4-5 seconds.

TEX RICKARD SUED FOR AN ACCOUNTING; PARTNERSHIP CLAIM

Frank C. Armstrong Alleges an Interest in Numerous Enterprises; Promoter Denies It.

New York, April 27.—Tex Rickard, sporting promoter, Wednesday was made defendant in a suit filed by Frank C. Armstrong, who alleges he had been associated with Rickard in a business way. He demands an accounting of several enterprises in which he maintains he had a share. The amount of Armstrong's claim is not set forth.

Mr. Rickard declared he had no dealings with Armstrong other than that the latter had been interested with him in the Rickard-Texas Oil Co., had made considerable money on the deal, and since that time had endeavored to interest himself in the various enterprises which Rickard had promoted. "He has no claim against me," said Rickard.

Among the deals in which Armstrong claims he was connected with the promoter are the Johnson-Jeffries fight in 1910, the Rickard-Texas Oil Co., the leasing of the Madison Square Garden, the Willard-Moran match, and the South American Land, Cattle, Packing and Concessions enterprise.

In connection with the Madison Square Garden enterprise, the complaint asserts Armstrong was instrumental in securing the lease for the arena, and it was agreed that Rickard was to have sole charge of the management, and receive 10 per cent of the profits as salary, and the remaining 90 per cent should be divided equally.

Armstrong in his complaint further alleges that Rickard is planning to transfer or turn over the lease of Madison Square Garden to individuals or corporations organized and controlled under the promoter's direction.

Four Counties Field and Track Competition Culbertson, April 30

Culbertson, April 27.—With the idea of fostering athletics among the high schools of Roosevelt, Daniels, Sheridan and Richland counties and for the selection of teams which will represent these schools at the interscholastic meet to be held later at Missoula, a track and field meet will be conducted in Culbertson, Saturday, April 30.

This gives promise of being the biggest athletic event of the season in eastern Montana. A bronze cup will be awarded to the winning team, banners will be given to the winners of relays and medals will be presented for individual honors. The program will consist of various track races from the 50-yard dash to the mile run, including hurdles and relays, and field events, consisting of shot-put, javelin and discus throws, high and broad jumps and pole vault. Dan Noble, of the state college, will officiate as starter.

Harry Sneed defeated Fred Algy in the playoff of a tie for third place in the pool tournament at the Hub Billiard parlor, Wednesday afternoon by a score of 100 to 45.
