

MEN WHO FLED THIS CITY DENY GUILT IN BUTTE

"Chuck" Hogan and William Enright, alleged hi-jackers and larcenists who fled from Great Falls in an automobile April 20 after receiving a mysterious warning from Havre by telephone, have pleaded not guilty to a charge of theft before a Butte United States commissioner and will have a hearing in federal court May 17, according to E. A. Killwyn, Canadian detective-sergeant of police who stopped in Great Falls while enroute from Butte to Regina. Willis McCoy, arrested with Hogan and Enright at Billings, is held on the same charge.

Women Supply Cues. Hogan and Enright were in Great Falls in company with two women for several days prior to their flight and to the fact that in their haste they left the women behind they owe their arrest. Within 15 minutes after they had been told to quit Great Falls immediately, by a person who called them from Havre, the men were speeding out of the city, but the women stayed until they could get some clothing from the laundry.

JURY'S OPINION DISREGARDED BY JUDGE'S RULING

Smelter Employee, Sick Eleven Months, Held Not Entitled to Free Doctoring. Disregarding the opinion of a jury that Ludwig Larson was employed at the B. & M. smelter when he or his family were attended by the smelter doctor, Dr. J. C. MacGregor in December, 1919, and April, 1920, Judge J. B. Leslie in district court Thursday rendered a judgment in which Dr. MacGregor's claim of \$200 against Larson was allowed. Larson denied the bill on the ground that he was a subscriber to the workmen's hospital fund and entitled to the services of the physician without charge.

Officers Watch Flight. Great Falls officials learned of the warning received by Hogan and Enright within a few minutes after its delivery and Havre was immediately asked whether officials there knew of any reason for detaining them. The reply was that Havre had never heard of the men and Hogan and Enright pulled out of Great Falls with officers watching them. The officers were suspicious because of the telephone warning but there was no reason for detaining them. At Billings the men were arrested at a hotel, each of them heavily armed. The officers found them. The women who were with them here had arrived in Billings when the arrests were made.

Baltazor Loses Suit on Tractor Part Sale. Claim of J. L. Baltazor against Joe Zuechich for the value of tractor parts and \$50 expenses was denied in a verdict returned in district court Thursday by a jury. Baltazor demanded \$100 for the parts in question and \$50 for expenses incurred in his effort to find them before the suit was brought. The suit grew out of the sale of a traction engine by Baltazor to Zuechich in 1919, the plaintiff claiming that parts which the defendant later obtained and placed on the machine were not included in the deal. Baltazor was represented by H. Novak and the defendant by O'Leary & Doyle.

Farmers Returning, Immigration Agent on G. N. Declares

That many farmers are returning to Northern Montana to resume farming operations this season was reported Thursday by Charles D. Greenfield, immigration agent for the Great Northern Railway, who arrived in Great Falls en route to the north for a conference with railroad officials.
