

HOSPITAL DAY TO BE MARKED IN THIS CITY

Dr. A. F. Longway Named Chairman to Arrange Plan for Observance Here.

Dr. A. F. Longway has been tendered and has accepted the Cascade county chairmanship in arranging for an observance of National Hospital day, Thursday, May 12. The state chairman, appointed by Matthew O. Foley, executive secretary of the National hospital day committee, with headquarters in Chicago, is Dr. Donald Campbell, of Butte. With a chairman in every county in Montana it is stated that the observance of the day will be state wide, with particular effort put forth in every town in which there is one or more hospitals.

Program to Be Educational.

Just what form the observance of the occasion will take has not yet been decided, except that it is probable that the day will be made one where visitors will be received at both hospitals in this city. A general mass meeting may be arranged to take place in one of the theaters, with speakers and possibly a moving picture showing hospital work and arrangements, if one can be secured within the time remaining.

National hospital day has been set aside by proclamation of President Harding and is being fostered by the government with the particular hope in view that the citizens at large will take advantage of the opportunity to ascertain by personal observation and investigation just what is being done in behalf of the wounded veterans of the world war, many of whom are being cared for in almost every hospital in the country.

The plan has the hearty approval and co-operation of the hospital and military authorities throughout the country and in 40 states and in four Canadian provinces organizations have been perfected within the last few weeks to make the day a success in an educational way. The day selected is peculiarly appropriate, being the anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale, whose work in the Crimean war resulted in the organization of the Red Cross. The purpose of the movement, aside from informing the people in the matter of the care and attention being given wounded war veterans, is to arouse the interest of the public generally in the work of the country's hospitals and similar institutions. Announcement of the plans for Great Falls will be made within a day or two.

Dr. Longway hopes to enlist the aid of the Ministerial association and possibly other organizations in making national hospital day both interesting and beneficial to the citizens of Great Falls and Cascade county.

MUSICAL PROGRAM AT KIWANIS CLUB

The following Great Falls artists were introduced by Clarence Conrad, in charge of the program committee: Mrs. Nels Thisted, pianist; Mrs. George Bell, soloist; Miss Olive Sorrick, accompanist; Miss E. McDermid, soloist; Miss M. Grover, violinist; Miss Kathleen Sutherland, soloist.

Mrs. Thisted opened the musical program with a selection followed by Mrs. George Bell rendering several songs accompanied by Miss Sorrick. Miss Sutherland was repeatedly encored following her offering and Miss Grover delighted the audience with several violin solos.

Following the program resolutions from the Kiwanis International were read by Secretary LeFebvre. The resolutions called for the abolition of use of any liquor at the national convention. Dr. Breese, president of the Great Falls organization and one of the delegates chosen for the convention, asked that a clause be in the resolution passed by the local club that any liquor taken will be for "medical purposes."

Charles R. Hansen seconded the motion and urged that the "prescription" be filed but not filled. A vote of thanks for the artists who entertained during the luncheon was passed.

WOULD CENTRALIZE MILK DISTRIBUTION

Power to Act Given New Executives Named by Central Montana Association.

Plans for the centralization of milk distribution in central Montana were discussed at the annual meeting of the Central Montana Milk Producers' association, held in the grand jury room of the federal building Monday afternoon.

The following executives of the organization were elected at the meeting: Manfred Lilliefors, president; A. G. Ely of Sun River; William F. Junkner of Armstrong; S. Bloom of Simms, and E. F. Lyman of Cascade, directors. The discussion held Monday, according to Mr. Lilliefors, involved the proposed erection of a plant in Great Falls to receive and distribute the milk products of the central Montana dairymen. The matter was left in the hands of the board of directors and action will be taken soon in the matter, it was announced.

"The organization has more than 100 members in central Montana," Mr. Lilliefors stated, "and it is our object to distribute the milk products of the central section of the state from one center, thus eliminating delay and unnecessary expense."

Irish "Holy Water" in Whisky Flask Is Object of Suspicion

Consternation was momentarily caused among the customs officials of Great Falls Monday when a flask containing a yellow-brown liquid was found among the foreign parcels addressed to a priest in Montana. The bottle was tightly corked, with a plugged sixpence hung around its neck. An investigation was made immediately and discovery was made that it was "holy water" in a whiskey flask, sent from a shrine in Ireland.

Among other interesting things in Monday's mail were an English gaiter suit and a pair of English cavalry boots with wooden boot trees, addressed to a rancher in this state.

13 BOOK BINDERS IN CITY ON STRIKE

Tribune Shop Only One Affected; Walkout Is Nation Wide in Scope.

As part of a nation-wide strike of job printers, to obtain a 44-hour work week for the wages hitherto paid for 48 hour's work, 13 employees of the Tribune Printing and Supply Co., all members of the bookbinders' union, went on strike Monday morning.

Although in other cities of Montana and in other states, the strike involved typesetters and pressmen, only the bookbinders went out in Great Falls, as the job printers in this city are under contract to remain at work at the old hours until June 1 and the pressmen are under contract until July 18.

In Helena two shops closed Monday, in Butte and Billings three each, and in Anaconda and Missoula one each. The strike in Great Falls is of part of a nation-wide movement of printers, pressmen and allied crafts in job printing shops to establish the 44-hour week. The employees in job shops have been working eight hours a day, making a 48-hour week. Printers employed by the daily newspapers work 7 1/2 hours a day, 45 hours a week.

Move is International. Although the bookbinders in the Tribune Printing and Supply Co. are out, the rest of the job shop is not affected.

The bookbinders could not do otherwise than go out, as the movement is international. Members of the allied printers' trades all over the United States employed in job shops are affected, where there are no contracts with the employers to interfere.

The strike is for a 44-hour week with no reduction in wages. The journeymen bookbinders in Great Falls have been working under a scale of \$39 a week, but have been receiving a bonus of \$3 a week, making their wages \$42.
