SCOUTS CONTEST TO GO TO CAMP

Five Troops Enter Competition in Attendance and Others Are Expected.

The second week of the Camp Rotary contest, for troop, school and church attendance for Boy Scouts, which will close June 13, has been completed and statistics show that only five troops have formally entered the contest. Other troops still have the opportunity of sending in their scores, and F. L. Graybill, scout executive, expects a few more troops to make returns. The results of the second week show Troop 4 as leading for the week, Troop 2, second; Troops 3 and 12 tied for third, and Troop 7 fifth. The total points for the two weeks of the contest show Troop 2 to be leading Troop 12 by 1.3 points per scout, with a total of 32 points. Troop 4 is third and Troop 3 ranks fourth. The troop which has the highest number of points per scout at the close of the contest will have the privilege of sending three scouts to Camp Rotary for a ten days outing, free of charge. The second best troop will be permitted to send two scouts and the third best will send one member. A scout employment agency will be opened up this year similar to the one that was in vogue last summer. Scouts will be available for various odd jobs and persons desiring to hire them for cutting lawns and doing other kinds of light work can secure their services by calling F. L. Graybill, at the office of the Boy Scouts of America. No charge is made for the use of the agency. Scouts who plan to be available for such service should register at the office of Mr. Graybill.
