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MOTHERS DAY SERMON CARRIES TRIBUTE TO WORLD'S WOMANHOOD

Montana Must Build Homes, Not Boarding Houses or Camping Places to Speed Welfare, Says Rev. Leo L. Totten.

Mother's day was celebrated by all of the churches of Great Falls Sunday at either the morning or the evening service. A special sermon on "Mother" was prepared and delivered by each pastor before large congregations. Musical programs were given in addition to the sermons.

"Mother, Home and Destiny," was the title of the Mother's Day sermon preached by the Rev. Leo L. Totten, pastor of the First Baptist church and which received much favorable comment from those who heard it.

Great Day of Year. "Mother's day is one of the great days in the calendar of the church year. On this day the fundamentals of religion, of home and the building of society are taught and exemplified.

"This is the most wonderful wedding on record. All creation had been newly finished and furnished as a dwelling place for man. The king's daughter was all glorious within. Her clothing was the effulgence of light enwrought with gold. It was with gladness and with rejoicing that she was led into the king's palace.

Sum's Wisdom of Ages. "In the gift of motherhood the parents present to the world not simply a being of flesh and blood, but a new life and a new soul. She must be a mother not only physically, but mentally and spiritually.

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Unit of All Society. "The home then is the unit of all society and the basis of the beginning of all progress. Here we must begin for the making of character and the molding of nations. And here it is that the Christ makes His great appeal when he begins for the salvation of man."

"So if we are to build a real civilization in Great Falls and Montana we must build homes, not boarding houses, not camping places, but homes, where the children are reared and where the highest moral character is developed."
