

60 PUREBRED SHORTHORNS SOLD AT PAVILION AUCTION

Top Price Is \$500, Paid by G. E. Dahlstrom of Conrad to E. A. Wilson of Moore for Two-Year-Old Bull.

Sixty registered Shorthorn cattle were auctioned Wednesday afternoon for an average of \$180 at the annual spring sale of the Montana Shorthorn Breeders' association, in the livestock pavilion. Stock was consigned to the sale from a dozen purebred herds and sales were well distributed over the state. A crowd of 500 attended the sale.

Top price of \$500 was paid by G. E. Dahlstrom of Conrad, Mont., to E. A. Wilson of Moore, Mont., for Villager's Marshall, a bull calved May 1, 1919. Top price for a female was \$400 paid by W. T. Cavitt of Shelby, Mont., to Sixsmith Bros. of Warren, Wis.

Animals of High Quality.

The cattle were all in excellent shape and were the highest quality of animals which the Montana Shorthorn Breeders' association ever put through a sale, according to Wayne W. Wheeler, secretary of the association.

Sale Places Officers.

Members of the Montana Shorthorn Breeders' association expressed satisfaction Wednesday night at their meeting in the Commercial club rooms. Secretary Wheeler was well satisfied with the outcome of the sale and considering present financial conditions said that it was all that could be expected.

"Of course the usual surprises of such sales were in evidence," Mr. Wheeler stated, "and many animals failed to bring the prices that were looked for, while others brought more than could be expected. One instance in particular in my mind is one of the members from Sheridan, Mont., who sold a bull for \$350 which he refused to sell less than a year ago for \$1500. But he felt that it was his own fault and did not complain. With present conditions the sale was highly satisfactory. There were many animals which brought 100 per cent of their value and others not 20 per cent."

Will Hire Field Man

BIG LAMB CROP REPORTED FROM SHEEP RANGES

Increase in Herds Is Hundred Per Cent, According to U. S. Forest Inspector.

Sheep in the White Sulphur and Martinsdale sections of the state are lambing 100 per cent, according to W. B. Willey, district forest inspector, who returned from a 10 days inspection trip in that country. Mr. Willey was primarily engaged in working out the general administrative plans to be used by the forest rangers and other forest officials in charge of the Jefferson national forest area this summer.

"The stock," said Mr. Willey, "are in excellent condition all through that section and the calf crop was extremely good. The stockmen and ranchers there are exceedingly optimistic, due to the recent rains. The range grass was quite short but it is expected that it will now be possible to turn the stock on it after May 15 or at least by June 1. The recent rain was the salvation of the stockmen, for the creeks were drier this spring than they were in the spring of 1919."

Between the farmers, stockmen and the trapper for the biological survey, the wolves, which have been very active in the western part of the Jefferson forest for the last few years, are gradually being eradicated, according to reports received by Mr. Willey on this trip. One rancher captured two she wolves and 13 pups from two dens. It is estimated that one wolf causes \$1,000 damage in a year.

Mr. Willey also reported that work had been resumed on the Y-G Bee line in Meagher county at Newlon creek. Three camp outfits are now located at this point. The King's hill road is impossible to pass over and will probably not be in shape until after June 1.


