### "Yakima Hundred" Trapshoot Classic to Be May 28 to 30

Trapshooters of the country, particularly in the west, will be interested in the special shoot of the Washington State Trapshooting tournament. The event is called the "Yakima Hundred" and is a 10 day event of 100 targets and will be shot in connection with the tournament at Yakima which will be held May 28, 29 and 30. The entrance fee is \$100 for entry and the purse will be divided 35-25-20-12-8. "With 30 entrants," writes G. A. Conklin, secretary of the tournament, "the winner will receive at least \$1,000 in cash which is more than the winner of the Grand American Handicap event draws. The advance reports indicate that there will be a classy field of competition and entries have been received from both eastern and southern points. Pictures of the leading competitors will be sent to different parts of the country. Immediately after the singles championship, contestants in the "Yakima Hundred" will be called to the firing line and will pose for the moving picture machine.

Ted Cleveland and Peggy Dowrey win many laughs with their witty chatter and you will never know "what a funny animal a solemn looking human are" until you see this mirthful satire. The second reel of the local movie will be filmed at the two performances of this week's bill this evening.
