

NATION IS MOURNING DEATH OF DISTINGUISHED JUSTICE

President in Person Carries Own Message of Grief to Family

Funeral Services Will Be Held Saturday Morning; Members of Supreme Bench Will Be Honorary Pallbearers.

Washington, May 19.—President Harding turned Thursday from the world wide problems that crowded upon him long enough to carry in person to the sorrowing family word of his own and the nation's grief in the death of Edward Douglass White, chief justice of the United States.

Accompanied by Mrs. Harding, the president drove to the White residence, and his wife, Mrs. Harding, carried their cards to the door, to be received by Justice White's niece, who came out to the White House car, and talked briefly with the distinguished visitor.

Meanwhile messages of sympathy and grief were pouring in from all parts of the nation, even from the and a mass to respect the senate adjourned for the day.

Services Private. Funeral services will be private, it was announced Thursday. They will be held Saturday morning at St. Matthews' Catholic church and will be conducted by the rector, the Rt. Rev. Monsignor Lee. Interment will be in Oakhill cemetery, Georgetown.

Justices of the supreme court will act as honorary pall bearers and members of the cabinet and other high government officials will stand.

As a mark of respect to the late chief justice, the senate, where he served a brief term, adjourned Thursday immediately after convening following announcement by Senator Cummins, president pro tem of senate, of Mr. White's death, and a brief eulogy by Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, the Republican leader. The house was not in session, having adjourned Wednesday until Friday.

Senate Appoints Committee. The senate adopted a resolution providing for a committee to represent it at the funeral. The committee included Senator Lodge, Senator Underwood of Alabama, the Democratic leader; Senator Randall and Broussard of Louisiana, Mr. White's native state; and Senator Nelson, Republican, Minnesota and Overman, Democrat, North Carolina, chairman and ranking Democratic member, respectively of the senate judiciary committee.

Senator Lodge said "a loss had befallen the country" in the death of the chief justice.

Eulogy by Lodge. "He filled one of the greatest offices which could be permitted to a man to hold," said Senator Lodge. "The late chief justice honored this place as much as the office honored him. He was devoted to his work, learned in the high-minded, impartial always, fearless in every zone of life and a lover of his country in every fibre of his being.

"His modesty was equal to the greatness of his place and no one who knew him, I believe, ever spoke of him without some accompanying word of affection."

Secretary Hughes Comments. Secretary Hughes, commenting upon the death of Chief Justice White, said: "The death of the chief justice removes one of our greatest jurists and he will be remembered as one of the leading figures in the history of the supreme court. He brought to the bench a broad experience, in which he had touched every side of life. In his relations with his brethren, with the bar and with all who came into contact with him, he showed an unflinching generosity and tenderness, and no public man of our time has been more dearly loved by all who knew him."

GREAT JURIST—TAFT. New Haven, Conn., May 19.—Former President William Howard Taft when informed of the death of Chief Justice White, said: "Chief Justice White's death will be mourned by the whole country. He was one of our great chief justices and has always been so regarded. A judge of the supreme court of Louisiana, he was elected United States senator from Louisiana. In his state he fought the good fight against the Louisiana Lottery and won. He was appointed to the supreme court of the United States from the senate by President Cleveland and after 17 years of service was in 1910 made chief justice. He was equally familiar with the civil and the common law. As a boy he was a Confederate soldier and was captured at Port Gibson, but no judge ever sat on the supreme bench who was more deeply an American, loving his country than he. His name is written large in the constitutional jurisprudence of this nation."

Colleagues Pallbearers. Justice McKenna, as senior associate member of the supreme court, formally notified President Harding, Vice President Coolidge and Speaker Gillett of the death of Chief Justice White. Following the court's custom in such cases the news was sent in a letter inscribed upon black-bordered parchment and enclosed in an envelope deeply edged in black.

"I am directed by the supreme court of the United States to notify the senate through you that the chief justice of the United States died Thursday morning at 2 a. m." Justice McKenna's note to Vice President Coolidge said.

The eight members of the court will act as honorary pall bearers if the family agrees to the suggestion that an official funeral be held.

"The machinery of the federal government will be halted during the funeral Saturday under an executive order issued by President Harding."

TAFT HEADS BAR. New York, May 19.—Former President Taft was named head of a committee Thursday to represent the American Bar association at the funeral of Chief Justice White in Washington Saturday.

Other members named were Elihu Root, Frank B. Kellogg of St. Paul, Minn., George Sutherland of Salt Lake City and Hamilton L. Carson of Philadelphia. All are former presidents of the association.

QUARANTINE ILLIS ISLAND. New York, May 19.—Ellis Island Thursday was placed under strict quarantine because of the death there today of a boy from typhus.

ASHES OF LANE TOBESCATTERED FROM YOSEMITE MOUNTAIN PEAK

Unusual Request of Former Secretary Is Explained by His Early Life Being Spent There

Chicago, May 19.—The body of Franklin K. Lane, former secretary of the interior, who died in Rochester, Minn., Wednesday was cremated here Thursday and the ashes will be taken to the top of El Capitan peak in the Yosemite valley, California, and scattered to the winds in compliance with a request made by Mr. Lane prior to his death.

Relatives of Mr. Lane explained the unusual request by saying that he had spent much of his life in the Yosemite region and had grown to love it so much that he wished his remains to be taken there when he died.

The body arrived here Thursday from Rochester and was immediately taken to Graceland cemetery for cremation. There were no funeral services, another request of Mr. Lane's, and only the immediately family attended the cremation. The body was accompanied by Mrs. Franklin K. Lane, the widow, and G. W. Lane, a brother.

The ashes will be taken west immediately it was said.

The following message of condolence over the death of her husband was received Thursday by Mrs. Franklin K. Lane from Grosvenor B. Clarkson, former director of the Council of National Defense, of which Mr. Lane was a member while secretary of the interior:

My deep and profound sympathy goes to you, a sympathy pervaded by the sense of losing the friendship of one of the noblest and most human Americans of his time.

From the early days of the war and of the council of national defense, of which your husband was a vital member, he always gave me counsel that was wise and sustaining and remarkable in its understanding of the needs of the country and of our allies, above all, of the human heart in a time of war. His courage was exemplified by the blunt manner in which, on his own initiative, he told about the actual losses caused by submarines when we were but half awake to our part in the war. As illustrating his vision I recall distinctly that in the council of national defense meeting of March 24, 1917, he said plainly:

It was described as an entirely arbitrary ruling, having no foundation in legal regulations.

The names most prominently mentioned in connection with a successor to Chief Justice White is Justice Day of Ohio, and Justice Holmes of Massachusetts.

Mormon Candidate. Should a promotion be made the vacancy thus created would be generally expected to go to George Sutherland, a former United States senator from Utah, and former president of the American Bar association.

During the last campaign Mr. Sutherland served in Mr. Harding's headquarters at Marion, and continued since the election a close friendship of many years' standing with the president.

N. J. Truckman Is Charged With Bombing Office of Federal Assay

Suspect Identified by Several Persons as Driver of Death Cart in Wall Street Blast.

New York, May 19.—A federal warrant was issued for Guiseppe De Filippo, Mayonna, N. J., truckman detained as a Wall street bomb plot suspect charging him with having attempted to destroy the United States assay office.

The warrant was issued by Commissioner Hitchcock on complaint of Charles H. Schully, head of the department of justice headquarters in this city, who said De Filippo had been identified by several persons as the driver of the death cart which figured in the explosion.

At the same time police announced that Thomas Smith, retired fireman, who weeks ago identified Tito Ligi, a Scranton painter, as the man he had seen talking to driver of the death cart, had told him De Filippo looked like the driver.

Identification of De Filippo as the bomb wagon driver by three men was "positive" and the department of justice has no doubt it has the right man this time, it was announced at the department's headquarters here.

Bayonne, N. J., May 19.—The police announced Thursday that three persons had identified Guiseppe De Filippo, Bayonne truckman, arrested Wednesday on suspicion, as the man they had seen in Wall street within a few hours of the disastrous explosion last September.

Two McCullys Sentenced to Life Terms in Deer Lodge

Wife, Stoical and Unconcerned, Remains Silent When Sentence Is Pronounced.

Thompson Falls, Mont., May 19.—Mrs. Mona May McCully, convicted by a jury in district court here of the murder of her son-in-law, Leon Richardson, and her husband, Fred McCully, who pleaded guilty Wednesday night to a charge of murdering Richardson, were sentenced by Judge Lentz Thursday morning to life terms in the state penitentiary.

Mrs. McCully, stoical and unconcerned, remained silent when sentence was pronounced upon her. Asked if he had anything to say her husband replied:

"My mind is wandering and so I am in no shape to talk. "From testimony offered by yourself and others it appears that you have been the instigator of this crime," Judge Lentz told Mrs. McCully, in passing sentence. "and I am not so sure but that justice would demand that you be hanged, but, hardly having the heart to hang you, I sentence you to life in the penitentiary."

The husband and wife will be taken to Deer Lodge Thursday afternoon to begin serving their sentences, it was announced.

Richardson was found shot dead in his automobile near Plains, Mont., last November. Mrs. McCully testified on the witness stand that she had killed Richardson and later changed her story and said he had been shot by an unknown man from ambush. Her husband, called as a witness for the defense, assumed the entire blame and indicated a desire to plead guilty at once to a murder charge.

New Liquor Ruling Affecting Envoys Are Promulgated

Washington, May 19.—(By The Associated Press.)—The state department has taken steps to guard more closely the only avenue by which alcoholic liquors for beverage use may enter the country. In a communication to the heads of the embassies and legations the department outlined new regulations governing the issuance and use of certificates under which members or employees of the missions may obtain liquor shipments, amendment of the existing rules appearing, being for the purpose of preventing possible misuse of such certificates.

REBELS' NOVEL ATTACK

Dublin, May 19.—Rebels have adopted a new method for attack on police barracks. Traveling by train Wednesday they compelled the trainmen to stop the train at Ballaghaderreen where they opened fire on the barracks. The police replied, wounding one passenger on the train.
