

FORMER HEAD OF G. N. HERE DIES IN EAST

E. L. Brown, Who Achieved High Place in Railway Circles, Succumbs.

E. L. Brown, 58, former president of the Minneapolis & St. Louis railroad and before that vice president and general manager of the Denver & Rio Grande railroad, died Saturday in St. Paul, according to word received in Great Falls by men who were associated with him in the latter nineties when he was general superintendent of the Great Northern, with offices in this city.

Mr. Brown was appointed regional director of railroads, southwestern region, at Dallas, Tex., in November, 1919, and later was a member of the railway labor board.

Born in Pella, Iowa, Mr. Brown, after receiving his education there, began his railroad career as a messenger for the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific. Later he was general agent at Duluth, Minn., of the old St. Paul & Duluth railway and held other positions on the road.

In 1902 he became general superintendent of the Michigan Central, held various executive positions with the Great Northern and in 1911 was a vice president of the Denver & Rio Grande. He was elected president of the Minneapolis & St. Louis in 1916.

A widow and a daughter survive. Funeral services probably will be held at Pella. A brother who is a banker lives in Des Moines.

Senator Loy Here Marking Buffalo Trail; Metal Bisons Point Way, Canada to Gulf



With the ever increasing impossibility of the East affording national parks and nature playgrounds, the eyes of the world have been diverted to the West and the government has set aside 12 locations which are to be national parks for all times. Various highways thread in and out through these localities and every effort has been, and is being expended to promote tourist travel over the highways leading to these playgrounds. For the purpose of aiding tourists in their travels over the Buffalo Trail, Senator Loren W. Loy, of Golden Valley county, secretary of the Buffalo Highway association, is in Great Falls and expects to remain for a few days placing the trail with signs of the buffalo and the slogan "Follow the Buffalo."

Short Cut to Billings. The Buffalo trail between Great Falls and Billings follows closely the line of the Great Northern railroad. Senator Loy says it is in good condition all the way.

Connecting 12 national parks and the Texas, Wyoming and Montana oil fields on the eastern slope of the Rocky Mountains, crossing railways and highways, the natural irrigated highland and livestock farms, and the continent from the Canadian line at Glacier National park to the Gulf of Mexico, stated Mr. Loy, "is the trail of the Buffalo."

Few people realize the importance of the western parks. Only a few years ago congress realized that the opportunity for national parks and playgrounds in the east had passed. As the country was settled and the timber cut, the lands was decided over to individuals and the obstacles increased. Glacier National Park, Yellowstone park and other western scenic localities, brought to the attention of the members of congress the necessity of such areas for the public. As a result there are now 12 national parks in the west. The Buffalo Highway begins at the

Canadian line and passes through Great Falls, the Judith Basin country, and Yellowstone valley, thence south to Cody, Wyo., through the entrance of Yellowstone National Park. From Cody it is to be continued to the south through the Wyoming oil fields, the Big Horn basin, Hot Springs at Thermopolis and Cheyenne, Wyo. The route will then be continued south through the Rocky Mountain park and into Denver.

The trip south from Denver is continued through the valley of Colorado Springs, in sight of the snow-capped peaks of the Rocky Mountains into Pueblo valley. At this point it will leave the park-to-park connections and continue to the southeast to Dallas and Fort Worth and on to Galveston. This is one of the greatest highway schemes in the world and is destined to support a month and a half ago. WHEAT ADVANCE AND RAIN BOOST SPRING ACREAGE

Previous Estimate Increased by Ten Per Cent, Says Grain Dealers Secretary.

The upward trend of wheat prices and the heavy precipitations of the last several weeks have caused the spring grain acreage in central and northern Montana to be increased at least 10 per cent over previous estimates, according to statistics by Secretary Jared Watkins of the Northwestern Grain Dealers association.

"The advance in wheat prices, of 14 to 16 cents has had a notable effect on spring planting," said Mr. Watkins. "I think the estimate of 10 per cent increase in last planted is well within the facts. This advance, coupled with the abundance of moisture, has tended to materially brighten the outlook and it is entirely consistent to say that the outlook is good. The cost of producing wheat has been greatly reduced and there is little doubt that an average yield will next fall bring a much greater profit than was realized even by those who sold at the top figures last year."

Secretary Watkins reports were received from Judith Basin points, Havre and points east of there, Box Elder, Big Sandy, Kremlin, Fort Benton, Sunburst, Valier, Conrad, the Sun River valley and the Great Falls territory. Throughout this area he estimates that with the increased acreage realized in the last two weeks the total will be equal to the pre-war figure, or within 20 per cent of the 1920 acreage.
