BIG TOPPING PLANT FOR LEWISTOWN TO BOOST OIL PRICES

William Livingston of Alberta Company Behind Project to Handle Cat Creek Product.

Special to The Tribune. Lewistown, May 22.—William Livingston, president of the Alberta Oil Co., who will be here Tuesday to work out the details for a large topping plant in Lewistown, has wired suggesting to the men back of the project that they immediately get as many independent operators interested as possible. With the topping plant going, says Mr. Livingston, he is satisfied there will be no trouble in securing better prices for Cat Creek oil.

President G. E. Froebroke, of the Froebroke Land Co., of St. Paul; Alfred Sorenson and Carl Mosig, prominent Texas oil operators, and their geologist, have just completed an examination of every known oil structure in this county and as a result of this tour, during which they traveled 1,200 miles, they are thoroughly convinced that there are other districts than Cat Creek that will be showing production inside of a few months. They have decided to secure acreage on some of the structures favored by their geologist and will give information as to their holdings later on.

Big Bud Progressing.
 The Big Bud well on the Forest Grove structure is now in a hard formation and Head Driller Frye reports that progress is slow. The company welcomes all visitors to its location.

There has been a good deal of misunderstanding regarding the holdings and plans of the West Dome company, the concern owned by President C. F. Kelley of the Anacosta company and a number of his associates, with some not in the Anacosta company. This concern's first well is in the Kootenai dome; the second is generally called the West Dome No. 1 but is in fact No. 2. This well got production in the shale and was only drilled on through the sand after the Frantz well on the Harlan tract was brought in. It is in section 9-15-29 and is a splendid producer. No. 3 well was brought in on April 21 with good production and No. 4 well will be completed along in June. Both these are in section 9-15-29. Early in June the West Dome will spud in No. 5 well and it is planned to have operations on at least one well and perhaps two going on continuously through the year.

Spud in Next Sunday.
 Next Sunday, May 29, the Oregon-Montana well spud in its well on section 29-14-26, on the Big Elk, located six miles northwest of Winnett. The drill will be started at 8 p. m., exactly.

this announcement being made because of the general interest in this project and the desire of many people to see the start.

The Frantz (Big Basin) is about ready to spud in on the Frantz tract in section 20-15-30, a light Standard rig being about rigged up and in condition to start.

It is persistently rumored that the Ohio will shortly start a well on the Musselshell Valley holdings, taken over by it, in section 22-15-30.

No further reports have been received up to this morning from the Thermopolis-Cat Creek well on the Hoover-Schwartz tract in section 11-15-29, but yesterday morning the oil was standing about 1,200 feet in the casing and has since come over.

A depth of 900 feet has been attained at the Edwards well in section 15-15-30 and casing is being set. Another special from Minesapolis, bringing a number of men interested in Cat Creek properties, will arrive here Wednesday or Thursday and the large party will immediately go on out to the field.

Mr. Corfield of Great Falls, has purchased a business site on Main street and will at once erect a two-story business block.

SELL OIL LEASES AT PUBLIC AUCTION IN WYOMING FIELD

United States Government to Offer Salt Creek Tracts to Highest Bidder, June 15.

An opportunity for Montana oil men to secure acreage in the Salt Creek oil field in Wyoming, is afforded by an announcement from the department of the interior stating that 6,480 acres will be sold at public auction at Douglas, Wyo., June 15. The sale will be held at the U. S. land office.

The lands have been divided into blocks of 160 acres each and consist of 16 "inside" tracts in the highly productive area and 25 "edge" tracts, each having an approximately equal value. The tracts will be sold to the bidder who offers the largest bonus. No one person, association, or corporation may purchase more than 640 acres. A base royalty of 33 1/3 per cent on the oil produced is fixed on the "inside" tracts, and of 25 per cent on the "edge" tracts. The base royalty on gas is the standard royalty fixed by the secretary of the interior on December 20, 1920.

Must Deposit Check.
 One-fifth of the bonus must be deposited in cash or certified check by the successful bidder on the day of the sale, and the remaining four-fifths must be paid in four equal quarterly installments, subject to the condition that the successful bidder deposit bank

certificates of deposit, liberty bonds, or corporate surety bond in the amount of the deferred payments.

All the above lands lie within the "geologic structure" of the Salt Creek oil field as outlined by the United States geologic survey on April 2, 1920. The principal functions of the geological survey under the oil-leasing act are to outline the productive oil and gas areas, to include them in formally defined "geological structures" and to advise the department of the interior as to the relations of all applications under the oil-leasing act whether for permits or leases, to geological structures, producing or non-producing.

Under Leasing Act.
 Under the terms of the leasing act the United States reclamation fund will receive 52 1/2 per cent of all bonuses and royalties paid under this sale, and the state of Wyoming will receive 37 1/2 per cent of them for use on public roads and in education.
