400 Knights of Columbus Attend State Convention Now in Session at Havre

Delegates Are Entertained at Barbecue at Fort Assiniboine and Will Be Taken on Trip to Oil Fields.

Havre, May 23.—Four hundred Knights of Columbus from every section of Montana are attending the seventeenth annual state convention now in session here and which will come to a close Tuesday evening. At a business session held Monday, State Deputy McMahon presiding, reports of officers were heard and committees were appointed. In the afternoon the visitors were taken by automobile to Fort Assiniboine, where they were entertained with field events and a barbecue. A baseball game was played between the Havre knights and a team composed of visiting delegates, which the Havre team won, 9 to 5, in four innings.

Monday evening at 7:30 the knights in a body attended a moving picture show showing scenes on the pilgrimage of the Knights of Columbus to France. At 9 o'clock a boxing card was pulled. A large crowd arrived from Great Falls in the afternoon to attend the fight and the last day of the convention.

Trip to Oil Field. Tuesday's program will begin with a business session at 9:30 in the morning.

SIGNS WILL MARK TWO PARK GATES

Auto Men Will Fix Tonight Date for Trip to Entrance to Yellowstone.

A definite date for making the trip to the Gardiner entrance of the Yellowstone National park to erect four signs advertising the Y-G-B Line, will be fixed this (Tuesday) evening by the Montana Automobile Dealers' association. A dinner has been arranged for 6 o'clock in the palm room of the Hotel Rainbow. A date would have been set earlier but for the fact that roads through the mountains have been virtually impassable during the past week. An up-to-date report on road conditions will be available at the luncheon.

Proponents of the proposed trip believe that the placing of signs near Gardiner will have the effect of diverting considerable tourist travel over the Y-G-B Line to Glacier National park. The signs are large and attractive and will be erected in conspicuous places. The Great Falls Ad club plans to purchase four similar signs for erection at the entrance of Glacier National park to encourage travel over the Y-G-B Line to the Yellowstone park.

Great Falls Company Will Drill Test Well on Virgelle Structure

A Great Falls company, officered by local business men, is rapidly developing plans for starting a test well on the Virgelle structure, between Fort Benton and Havre. The company holds 6000 acres on the structure and it is the intention to have the test well started within the next 60 days, according to an announcement made Monday. The company is capitalized at \$200,000, of which Scott Leavitt is president. Otto Gerth is vice president and A. D. Johnson is secretary and treasurer. In organizing the company, the organizers acted upon government and private geological reports on the Virgelle structure. The dome is believed to contain commercial oil, gathered from a large area.
