

DEMPESEY PERFORMS BEFORE DAUGHERTY, ATTORNEY GENERAL

Champion Puts in Strenuous Day; Will Rest for Whole Week in June.

Atlantic City, N. J., May 24.—With Harry M. Daugherty, attorney general of the United States, as his guest, Jack Dempsey Tuesday went through the most strenuous work-out he has indulged in since he started training here 10 days ago.

Dempsey was presented to Mr. Daugherty before going to his indoor gymnasium. The attorney general chatted with the champion for a few minutes and then posed for pictures.

"Well, I am the attorney general of the United States and I think it's my duty to be there to see if the fight is on the level. Draw your own conclusions from that."

After punching the bag and shadow boxing, Dempsey took on Larry Williams, Jack Renault, Alex Trambitas and Babe Herman in succession.

Dempsey has progressed so rapidly in his training that the Kearnas camp plates giving the champion a week of absolute rest, probably the first week of June.

With Dempsey rapidly getting into condition, the shortage of heavyweight sparring partners in the champion camp at present is causing Manager Kearnas no alarm.

Leo Hauck was given a rest Monday to recuperate from the punishing effects of his work with the champion. He was persuaded to remain another week.

HAVRE HEADLINERS GIVE GLASSY BOUT IN MONDAY'S EVENT

Shauer and Fowler Arrive in Great Falls Little the Worse for Battle.

Johnny Schauer of St. Paul and Monk Fowler of New Orleans arrived in Great Falls Tuesday night from Havre, where they fought a spectacular draw Monday night. Both were in good luck and did not appear much affected by the thrilling battle they staged before a capacity house.

The 15-round headline event between Schauer and Fowler was a classy bout, and from the opening gong until the final round was ended there was no lack of interest in the bout. Both boys were close to the same weight and there was not the difference anticipated.

Schauer weighed 134 1/2 pounds at 3 p. m. the day of the fight and Fowler tipped the beam at 139 pounds. There was probably a difference of five or six pounds at the ring side.

From the time the first blow was landed each lad tried hard for a K. O. Fowler's left laced the strength and he contented himself with tantalizing Schauer with his jab to the face, but on a number of occasions elected to stand toe and toe with Schauer and exchange lefts and rights.

The hardest blow landed was Schauer's right cross in the 14th round and it took the Monk just above the heart. It weakened the New Orleans fighter, but he came back shortly and they exchanged lefts and rights at the close of the round.

Of the 15 rounds seven were even, four went to Schauer and a like number to Fowler. Rounds 1, 4, 6, 11, 12, 13 and 15 were even. Fowler won rounds 3, 5, 9 and 10 and Schauer had the better of the fighting in rounds 2, 7, 8 and 14. Fowler's best round was the 10th, and the Monk had the St. Paul light twice with his jabbing left into which at times he put his whole fighting weight. This was the clearest round for the Monk and was sufficient to give him the edge on the battle up to the 13th round.

Schauer Speeds Up. It looked up to that time as though the lighter fighter was going to carry away the honors, but Schauer's momentary weakness seemed to cause a reaction to set in and after coming back gradually in rounds 11, 12 and 13 he showed a burst of speed in the 14th round which won a draw for him and which nearly terminated the Monk.

Schauer leaves tonight (Wednesday) for Rock Island, Ill., where he meets Frankie Welch on Decoration day, May 30. From Rock Island he will go to Detroit, Mich., where he will fight a 15-round bout with Mickey Donnelly on June 10. Fowler will probably remain in Great Falls for some time, but Jack Russell, his manager, stated a short time ago that they will probably go to Salt Lake City or to the coast.

Pete Bross, Great Falls middleweight, is knocking out his opponent, O'Neill Collins of Havre, in two and one-half minutes, clearly demonstrated that he is out to climb the ladder of fistic fame. Bross has the necessary kick in either mitt and when it lands the fight means a close. The preliminaries on the Havre card were as good as could be found. Gordon Colbrook of Havre is a classy 129 pounder and with a little experience will be a hard boy to beat.

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JOE LYNCH BARRED FROM NEW YORK RING ON HOLYOKE CHARGE

Billy De Foe of St. Paul, One of Three Suspended for 30 Days for Fouling.

New York, May 24.—Suspension of Joe Lynch, world's bantamweight champion, was announced Tuesday night by the New York state boxing commission, which stated that Lynch and his manager, Eddie Meade, had been suspended pending further action by the Massachusetts state board of boxing which previously had suspended them on a charge of violating a contract to box at Holyoke, Mass., April 29.

Three pugilists, receiving 30 day suspensions by the committee because they had been disqualified for committing fouls were Earl Baird, of Seattle; Billy DeFoe, of St. Paul, and Mike McFigue, of New York.

The license of Jack Dillon, Indian apollo middleweight, has been revoked, which was announced, as an examination showed that he was not in proper physical condition to box.

Chicago, May 24.—Dominick Mulrennan, for the Chicago White Sox, with timely hitting behind him, defeated Washington, 6 to 5. Everett Yarran, last year's home run hitter of the Western league, took Schalk's place behind the plate and drove out two doubles, scoring one run himself and driving in two others. CARPENTIER WORKS TEN MINUTES, CALLS IT DAY'S TRAINING

Finishes With Long Ramble in Woods With Dog, and an Automobile Ride.

Manhasset, N. Y., May 24.—In keeping with his one day's work, one day's rest schedule, Georges Carpentier Tuesday spent 10 minutes at light exercise, went for a long ramble in the woods, with his dog, took a short automobile ride and then called it a day.

This (Tuesday) afternoon Georges did not come out for his usual lawn party with Manager Deschamps, Trainer Wilson and other members of the training camp squad. This keenly disappointed a crowd of small boys hoping to glimpse the challenger, Italian Joe Gans, who has been employed as one of Georges' sparring partners, was due to arrive in time to start work Wednesday when, if the weather is favorable the challenger will get in his first ring work.

Development of speed and cunning will be the chief factors sought for in the training of Carpentier, for he relies mainly upon these two points to bring him victory over Dempsey July 2.

The smiling blonde boxer works easy and with a speed that dazzles. He is at all times on his toes, working the punch from both sides. His upper cut is well executed and his recovery perfect.

Deschamps thinks too much training would do more harm than good. Consequently, the French boxer will in reality rest every other day, taking, of course, light exercise each morning and perhaps some road work.

In keeping with the edict of Deschamps and Trainer Gustave Wilson, he will work with Paul Journea, the French heavyweight, and with Marco, a lighter man. These two will alternate with Joe Jeannette and Gans, so that Carpentier will meet only one heavy man on each boxing day.

South Dakota Test of Sunday Baseball Brings "Not Guilty."

Redfield, S. D., May 24.—A verdict of not guilty was returned Tuesday afternoon by a jury in Judge A. S. Gillette's court in the first test case on Sunday baseball in South Dakota.

The action was brought against the Redfield baseball club as a result of a game played at Tulare between Redfield and Breckenridge-Wahpeton last Sunday. The state introduced witnesses to show that tickets had been purchased for the game, such tickets bearing the words:

"This is not an admission ticket—parking ticket. The defense showed that the tickets were sold only for parking space for cars or seats in the grandstand. The game, according to the defense, could be seen without charge."

Roy T. Bull, attorney for the defense, pointed out that the statute specifically provided that baseball games were forbidden on Sunday only where an admission fee was charged or where something was received by the manager as a consideration for witnessing the game.

The jury was out only 10 minutes.
