New York, May 27.—The market was largely a professional affair today and trading was limited in volume. The outstanding developments of the day were the declaration of the usual semi-annual dividend on Baldwin and the remarks of Judge Gary, in which he indicated that further adjustment in the price of steel products may be necessary before new business on a large scale can be looked for.

BIRD IS OMEN OF GOOD CROP SAY FARMERS

Birds as an omen of bountiful crops may be a new basis of reckoning with the prognosticators, but in the north country the people are hopefully reminded of the big year of 1916 through the appearance of a species of bird which declined to make its habitat in the state during the years of low production. Thousands of birds are swarming over the fields in northern Montana and their presence for the first time since the last year of huge returns has caused considerable comment, according to Vice President P. H. Jones of the Stanton Trust & Savings bank.

The alleged theft covers a period of years. At the time of his arrest, it is said more than \$1,000 worth of the metal was in his possession.

CUT CABLES TO IRELAND
