**MIDDLEWEIGHT BOUT FOR NEXT CARD IS DESIRED IN HAVRE**

**Promoters Angle for Boxers; Fowler May Meet France in Great Falls.**

While the Great Falls promoters are figuring on signing lightweights for the headline event on their next boxing program which will likely be staged June 20 or thereabouts, the promoters at Havre are angling for a couple of fast middleweights in the hope that they can give the fans a little different style of fighting by men of a different class. Undoubtedly Monk Fowler and Earl France will be signed for the next headline event in Great Falls, provided they will meet the terms of the matchmakers. Many fans are clamoring for the bout and will not be satisfied until they have seen the Monk and the lawyer in the same ring. The legion matchmakers are waiting to hear from France regarding the match and Fowler has signified his desire through his manager, Jack Russell, to meet France provided he will make at least 135 pounds at 3 o'clock.

Jack Mabey who, with Eddie White, arranges the cards for Havre, was in Great Falls Thursday and is in favor of putting on a headline event between middleweights on their next program. The Havre promoters are dickered with Jack Malone of St. Paul and are seeking an opponent for him. Jack Russell informed Mabey that he has a fighter who will willingly tackle the clever Malone in Salinas Jack Robinson of the Pacific coast. The coast fighter has fought and beaten such men as Frank Barry, Frankie Denny, Steve Dalton, Johnny Celmar and Kid Palmer. He lost to Battling Ortega and fought a draw with Johnny McCarthy. Russell intends to bring Robinson to Great Falls if it is possible to line up a few fights for him.

Clarence Strobele of Big Sandy, who won from Pete Bross on a foul at Fort Benton on Memorial day, is anxious to meet Bross in Great Falls on the next fight program. An emissary of the Big Sandy fighter was in Great Falls Thursday and stated that the Big Sandy middleweight will make 160 pounds for Bross if signed for the next show. Strobele prefers 165 pounds and from all accounts liked 175 at Fort Benton. Fred Goldbach, Bross' manager, stated that Bross will fight Strobele if the latter can make 165 pounds, but would not care to meet him and concede 15 or 20 pounds as he did at Fort Benton. Bross learned a few things in his fight with Strobele and his manager learned some things also which he will profit by in the future.

Another word comes from Fred Winsor, manager of Willie Meehan, the California fat boy, stating that his protégé is open to meet any heavy in the world and would like to meet one or two of them in Montana. Winsor gloats over the fact that the "fat boy" has two decisions over Champion Jack Dempsey. Great Falls is a long ways from Willie's home and he might make more money by fighting the battle be-

fore California fans. Heavies may come here later, but at present the promoters could hardly bring Meehan from the coast and bring an opponent either from the east or west.

It was rumored around Great Falls Thursday that Jack Josephs, the Minneapolis lightweight, was in town, but the rumor was unfounded. Abe Ginsberg, Minneapolis lawyer, and a friend of his were in Great Falls, but the friend was not Jack Josephs.

**Yank Tennis Experts Defeat French; Hold Semi-Finals Place**

St. Cloud, France, June 2.—All the American tennis players surviving the elimination trials in the hard court tournament reached the semi-finals today (Thursday.) William T. Tilden, American grass court champion, qualified for the second and last round in the semi-finals by defeating M. Danet, 6-2, 6-1, 5-7, 6-0, while Tilden and Arnold Jones earned the right to remain in the doubles by winning from the French pair, Coutans and Fares, 6-3, 4-6, 6-0, 6-1.

William H. Laurentz, world's champion at singles on hard courts, was eliminated by Pegner of Denmark in straight sets, 6-4, 6-4, 6-3. Laurentz lost to the youthful Dane's good service, excellent backhand strokes and all around steadiness.

Tilden showed improved form in the match with Danet, except in the third set when, after leading by five games to two, he grew careless and presented his opponent with the set. Tilden then through the fourth set, allowing the Frenchman only a few points.

**All Yank Entrants Out of Ladies Golf**

Turnberry, June 2.—Miss Joyce Wethered, the English closed champion, defeated Miss L. Scroggie, the Scottish star, 8 up to 6 to play, in the first of the semi-final matches of the British ladies' open golf tournament Thursday.

Miss Janet Jackson, the Irish champion, defeated Mrs. Alan MacBeth at the nineteenth hole.

Miss Cecil Leitch, British open champion, defeated Mrs. Cautley of Janet, 2 up and 1 to play, in the fifth round.

In the other semi-final match Miss Cecil Leitch, the British open champion, beat Miss Janet Jackson, the Irish champion, by one up.

All the American entrants have been eliminated.

**Refusal to Play Suspensions Sequel**

Yakima, June 2.—President E. J. Barnes of the Yakima baseball club has received from L. J. Barnett, secretary of the Pacific International baseball league a message notifying him that the suspension of Manager Blankenship and First Baseman Dempsey of the Victoria team will stand until their attack on Empire Field at the close of Wednesday's baseball game is thoroughly investigated.

A league representative was in Yakima today to investigate.

Barnes has issued a statement saying that neither Blankenship nor Dempsey would play again on the Yakima ball grounds and that the Yakima Braves would not play against them on any field.

When Blankenship received word of his suspension he wired President Ritchet of Victoria that the team would not play Thursday if the suspension of Dempsey is enforced.
