

CITY EMPLOYEES STRIKE BROKEN SAY OFFICIALS

Applicants for Work Are Accepted Without Question as to Union Affiliation.

The strike called by the Federal labor union last Wednesday as a result of wage reductions ordered by the city council virtually broke down Friday through the employment of men whose offers to work were accepted by the street, garbage and boulevard departments, according to Acting Mayor R. H. Johnson.

Today (Saturday) applicants for work will be listed and given employment in the order of their applications, Mr. Johnson stated. All but three of the men who went to work in the garbage department were old employees but in the street department the percentage of new hands was larger.

Applications for employment rapidly increased immediately after the noon hour, but numerous men applied during the forenoon. Employment of men at both the tool house and the boulevard superintendent's office was supervised by the acting mayor and different of the city aldermen, this course being decided upon after instructions to put men to work had miscarried Thursday.

Business agents of the union men favoring the strike were on the works at different times during the day and one or two laborers spoke of having been "ragged," but there was no demonstration of any moment, Mr. Johnson said.

"The situation is entirely satisfactory tonight," said Mr. Johnson. "There is nothing to indicate that a full crew will not be available Saturday and we expect things to go along much as they did during the week."

The council last Tuesday cut the charge immediately upon its arrival. It will reach home today and will take has been in Spokane for the last week, pay of day laborers from \$5.50 to \$1.50 and teamsters from \$5.75 to \$5.

TEAMSTERS' AND HELPERS' WAGES CUT BY PRIVATE EMPLOYERS TO SCALE SET BY CITY THIS WEEK

Wages of teamsters working in Great Falls for private individuals and companies will be cut to \$5, beginning Monday morning, and the wages of helpers and common labor will be reduced to \$4.50. The cut is 75 cents for teamsters and \$1 for helpers, and the reduction is the same as that voted by the city council last Tuesday and put into effect for city employees Wednesday morning.

Great Falls, Missoula and Billings Delegates to Cleveland Plan Costumes.


Auto With Whisky Held Up With Shots on Lewistown Street
