

SHEEP SHEARING IN FULL SWING NEXT FEW DAYS

Crews Are Organized in Great Falls to Denude Woolies of Winter Coats.

The annual work of harvesting the wool crop in this section of Montana will be under full head before the end of the present week.

Shearers who arrived in Great Falls Thursday stated that shearing is now under way at the Albright ranch at Albright, and at the ranch of the Northwestern Sheep Co., at Fort Benton.

Shearers Get 12 1/2 Cents. Shearers are this year receiving 12 1/2 cents a fleece and board, according to statements made by the men.

Shearing has been under way at Billings, Livingston, Dillon and Miles City for about 10 days, according to Great Falls stockmen, and work will be completed in these territories somewhat in advance of that in the northern part of the state.

Quality is Good. The quality of Montana wool is exceptionally good this year, the shearers say, and the belief is expressed that it will receive close attention from the buyers.

The number of sheep ranged in Montana this spring is considerably below the pre-war figure, but several ranches in this section of the state have bands of some size.

STATE HIGHWAY MEMBERS WILL BE HERE TODAY

Commission Will Hold Regular Meeting and Inspect Federal Aid Roads.

To inspect roads built in Cascade county with federal aid and to hold a business meeting in Great Falls, all members of the state highway commission will arrive here today (Friday) for a stay of several days.

The commission is composed by George Lanstrum of Helena, Henry Good of Kalispell and H. A. Templeton of Great Falls. Chief Engineer John Edy and Resident Engineer E. T. Harlow will attend the meeting.

Maintenance Up to County. Construction of roads built with federal aid is supervised by the state highway commission, but maintenance work is wholly within the jurisdiction of the county, according to Engineer Harlow.

To See Bridge Approach. The north approach to the Tenth street Missouri river bridge, now under construction, was partially financed through federal aid and the commission will inspect the work while in the city.
