READY FOR LIGHT. SAY BIG CONSUMERS. IF FREIGHT IS OUT. Representatives of Industries Unite With Mines in Marketing Plan.

Helena, June 24.—The marketing of eastern Montana lignite will be an easy matter if the freight rates on the transportation of this low grade fuel can be lowered, according to statements of representatives of the mining industry and of big industrial consumers at the hearing conducted at Poplar, Wednesday, by Railroad Commissioners Lee Dennis and S. M. Ross, assisted by Reporter A. Winter.

The operators of the lignite mines asked for a reduction of freight rates to all points in Montana from the mines in the northeastern part of the state, principally Fairview, Brockton and Medicine Lake.

It was claimed by the operators that the present rates are too high to permit them to enter into competition with the higher grade coals and that they should be given a lower rate so as to place them upon a more equitable basis.

The principal complainant was Warren Jenkinson, manager of the Jenkinson Lignite Mining company at Fairview, and large consumers who testified that they would use lignite if the price were reduced.
