Carpentier Now Wants to Meet Tom Gibbons or 'Knockout Brennan'

Acknowledges Dempsey Is His Superior but Claims Light Heavyweight Title and Will Seek Match Here.

Manhasset, N. Y., July 3.—(By the Associated Press.)—Georges Carpentier will not retire from the ring as a result of his defeat by Dempsey. He will fight any man in the world excepting the champion, who he admits is his superior.

Broken Hand Set. The broken bone in Georges' right hand was set Sunday and it was said it was much better, although it was still swollen and inflamed.

Wants Brennan or Gibbons. "I would like to get a match with Bill Brennan or Tom Gibbons," Desamps said. "The doctor says that Georges' hand will be all right with careful nursing. We may remain tight here in Manhasset for a while. Georges will keep in shape and will be ready if challenged."

Dempsy's Blows Hurt. Carpentier, through his comrades, told his story of the fight this (Sunday) noon, while resting on the front porch. He had been instructed by Willson and Desamps to be wary and let Dempsy force the battle, but just before the opening bell, he said to them: "The American people have been told that I was a game and courageous fighter. I must fight. Watch me!"

Compliments Dempsy. "I kept saying to myself, 'Georges, you must get up; you must go on and fight,' but I could not. The gentleman all the time. There was not an untoward remark passed during the four rounds. It was an honor to have fought him, and believe me, I don't think it is a disgrace for any man to be defeated by him. He's a great fighter, and it is my prediction that he will be champion for many years to come."

RICKARD'S PROFIT IS HALF MILLION ON SATURDAY BOUT

Expenses Total Nearly Million and Gate Receipts More Than Million and Half.

New York, July 3.—Tex Rickard figured Sunday that his net profit from the Dempsy-Carpentier fight would be in the neighborhood of \$550,000. Expert accountants were busy all day checking and balancing the books used in the promotion of the contest. Mr. Rickard said he did not expect a final and accurate statement before Wednesday but that expenses of all kinds would approximate \$950,000, and taxes on his share \$100,000, while the gross gate receipts were expected to exceed \$1,000,000.

It was also figured that Dempsy earned in the neighborhood of \$20,000 a minute for his 10 minutes and 16 seconds of actual fighting. Carpentier's profits as the loser in the contest were approximately \$19,500 a minute.

The United States government will receive in one form of taxation or another, a considerable portion of the \$300,000 paid Dempsy and the \$200,000 which was Carpentier's share of the purse. Total government proceeds from the bout will total more than \$400,000, revenue officials estimate.

Dempsy's Tax \$160,000. The income tax will take about \$160,000 of the \$300,000 earned by Dempsy and about \$7,000 of Carpentier's share. The federal revenue from the sale of tickets will amount to \$160,000.

Ticket sellers who resold the pasted-up tickets at an increased price are required to give 50 per cent of their profits to the government. The state of New Jersey, under provisions of the boxing law, collects 10 per cent of the gate receipts. Profits of preliminary boxers and all ring officials also will be taxed, adding to the government proceeds of the bout.

George Carpentier must pay his entire tax to the United States before sailing for France. Dempsy next year, the first being due in March 1922. Revenue officials have pointed out that Carpentier also is likely to face another string of income tax on arrival in France, shrinking still more the earnings of the defeated boxer.

Contest Set Record. In many respects, the contest, from a news reporting standpoint, was the greatest of its kind in the world. According to actual count, there were 823 reporters and telegraphers in the two press sections of the arena. More than 100 wires, including telegraph, cable, and telephone, were used to carry the news to every point of the world. While accurate figures are unavailable it is estimated that the number of words filed about the fight either in Jersey City or New York during the 16 hours between 8 a. m. and midnight on July 2, ran close to the million mark.

Messages were received by Rickard from many persons congratulating him upon the success of his enterprise, including two from William A. Brady and Charles A. Cochran, who were the joint promoters with Rickard when the contract for the bout was signed. Later both Brady and Cochran withdrew and left Rickard to promote the affair alone.
