


The Sunny Side Aid society of the First M. E. church will meet in the church parlors Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

W. P. Shriver of Presbyterian Mission and Immigrant Board Says Industrial Plants Are "Little Red School" House for Foreigners.

"Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."—Matthew, 5:40.

"What are we going to do with the foreigner in this country? What is the foreigner going to do with us? In these two questions is wrapped one of the most important of the most crucial issues America faces in this generation."

Vocational Men at U Among Best Students

Missoula, July 3.—Among the eighteen highest students in the university for the winter quarter four were vocational students. According to Allen Swift, vocational advisor for the southwest Montana district, the learning capacity of these rehabilitated men has increased 27 per cent. The Forestry school has the heaviest enrollment of vocational men and for the first time the forestry school has been holding classes during the summer term. The work in that school is proving very successful because students have easier access to practical work in botany, geology and work in the lumber country than they do in the winter. The men are paid a living allowance, \$100 a month. Their books and tuition are paid and if a man is married his allowance increased to \$150. Those who are apprentices in some trade are given the same allowance and are supplied with tools and given a job when their apprenticeship is over. According to Mr. Swift there will be a large number registered in the university in the fall. He says it is the greatest educational advantage ever offered disabled soldiers.
