WILL ASK BANKERS OF MONTANA HERE
Invitation to Be Extended at 1921 Convention in Helena in August.
Prospects that Great Falls will be selected as the next convention city of the Montana Bankers' association at the conclusion of the 1921 session which meets in Helena, August 4, 5 and 6, are exceptionally bright, according to A. R. Casteel, editor and publisher of the Montana Banker. A move has already been started to bring the financiers to this city, he added. As far as Mr. Casteel has been able to learn no other city contemplates bidding for the convention and the fact that Great Falls has not entertained the bankers for several years, gives further assurance that the next convention will come to Great Falls.
There is also a possibility that a Great Falls banker will be elected to one of the high positions in the association at the coming convention, according to Mr. Casteel. So far this has not been given to the bankers in other leading cities. It is the practice of the association, said Mr. Casteel, to advance the vice president to the presidency, making the vice president the highest post available by rotation.
Mr. Casteel has received a letter from A. T. Hibbard, secretary of the association, stating that many of the country's foremost bankers and financiers will attend the Helena convention. W. P. G. Harding, governor of the federal reserve board and considered one of the leading financial experts in the United States, has been secured for the principal address. Frank O. Lowden, former governor of Illinois, is also on the speaking program. Several officials from the reserve banks of Minneapolis have made reservations.

GIBSON MEMORIAL SWITCH IS MADE
COMMITTEE MEETS IN PANTAGES BILL
Mrs. Dudley Crowther Named Custodian of Funds to Receive All Donations.

The Paris Gibson memorial committee, named Friday by President W. A. Bertke of the Commercial club, had its initial meeting Monday afternoon. One of the members of the committee, Charles M. Russell, will leave in a day or two for Lake McDonald to spend the summer, and it was deemed advisable to have a meeting before he left. The committee organized by the election of Harry B. Mitchell as chairman and B. J. Boorman as secretary.

There was discussion in the committee as to the form that the memorial would take whether it would be a statue or a memorial building of some sort, but no conclusion of any sort was reached and there is no thought of reaching any conclusion until much more information is at hand than is now available.
"Before any final decision is made the public will be taken fully into the confidence of the committee as it is desired to do just what the people of Great Falls wish done in this matter," said Chairman Mitchell after the meeting. "It is realized that a considerable sum of money will be required to erect a memorial which will be a worthy tribute to the grand old man who was the creator of Great Falls and which will last as long as Great Falls lasts; and it is also realized that times are not now propitious for the raising of money."

The committee is disposed to take its time in the matter, and it will keep the public informed of any progress made. Meantime Mr. Boorman, as secretary, is going to give considerable time during the next two weeks in getting together such information as will be useful to the committee.

City Strike Situation to Be Before Council Again This Evening
Another discussion of the city strike situation seems likely when the city council meets tonight (Tuesday), although it has not been definitely reported that the topic will be breached again by labor representatives. It is believed that another attempt will be made to interject the subject into the proceedings.

How successful the labor forces will be in the event of a further discussion is answered by the fact that the seven unions which have already constituted a barrier to the approaches of the laborites, now stand more firmly than ever against considering new proposals for settlement.

The Huley proposal for arbitration, submitted at the last session, failed to impress the majority of the council members as a feasible and legitimate basis for settlement because it "simply not arbitration on a business basis." Arbitration through the averaging of the scales paid in first and second rate Montana class was the adjustment of the Great Falls rate in accordance with the results, is the only plan thought acceptable to the council.
