Alan Trank, Idaho, July 4.—Mike Gibbons, St. Paul middleweight, defeated Al Sommers, Spokane, claimant to the Pacific coast middleweight championship Monday, when Sommers' seconds threw the towel into the ring after one minute of fighting in the eleventh round of a scheduled 15-round fight. Sommers was knocked down twice for a count of nine in the tenth round.

## Kelly Forces Fight, Easily Bests Mason

Benton Harbor, Mich., July 4.—"Jimmy" Kelly, of Chicago, won a newspaper decision over Frankie Mason, of Fort Wayne, Ind., in a 10-round boxing match Monday, Kelly forcing the fight in every round and proving superior in aggressiveness. Kelly split one of Mason's ears with hard jabs, and scored repeatedly with body blows. They are flyweights.

## PRESBYTERIANS OF MONTANA TO CONVENE HERE

### Ministers and Lay Delegates Expect to Come to Meeting Next Week.

Presbyterians from all over Montana will attend the annual synod and summer conference of that church in this city July 12 to 17, according to the expectations of those in charge of the convention. The meetings will be held at the First Presbyterian church, with the exception of a few small sessions which the women will hold in other churches.

"Saturday and Sunday will be the two big days," said the Rev. Leo J. Tetter, of the First Presbyterian church of Great Falls. "On these two days we expect that people from all the country round will drive in and make it a sort of picnic season, concluding the conference with a record attendance. Our present expectations are that at least three and maybe four delegates will attend from each of the 90 churches in the state—one minister, one layman, one woman delegate, and in most cases one representative of the Christian Endeavor society."

Those in charge of the program for the convention this year have received acceptances from a number of prominent Presbyterian clergymen to attend and among the latter will be the Rev. W. P. Shriver, of New York City; the Rev. David G. Wylie, the Rev. W. S. Holt, the Rev. William Hiram Foulkes, the Rev. William J. Johnson, the Rev. Harold McA. Robinson, the Rev. W. R. King, the Rev. Charles E. Brandt, and the Rev. Charles McDonald.

Plans have been made so that all trains will be met by Great Falls residents to receive the visitors. Lodging and breakfast for the latter will be the charge provided all and those in charge believe they have everything in readiness for an usually successful meeting.

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## Four Cities Share in Rowing Honors of People's Regatta

Philadelphia, July 4.—Oarsmen of four rowing centers shared in the glory of victory in the Peoples regatta, a feature of the Independence day celebration here, in a series of hard-fought races over a mile and a quarter straightaway course on the Schuylkill river. Racing conditions were ideal, although the heat caused many of the oarsmen to topple over at the finish. All were quickly revived.

Philadelphia clubs won eight events, the West Philadelphia club leading with four victories, and a second place in five starts. New York entries won three races; Walter Hoover, of the Duluth boat club two, and the Potomac boat club of Washington, D. C. one. The Washington canoe club crews won both singles, which were rowed over a half mile course.

The Malta Boat club of Philadelphia won the intermediate eight-oared race by one and a half lengths from the Potomac crew. Walter Hoover won two events against the same field.

In the senior quarter mile dash, Hoover beat Gilmore Garrett, of the Duluth club, by a length and two lengths later he outclassed the field in the championship singles winning from Garrett, who finished second, by six lengths.

Hutterly, of the Potomac club, won the association singles event. Hutterly dashed ahead of Morgan LeCutter of New Rochelle, N. Y., in the last quarter mile and won by two lengths in 8 minutes 10 seconds.
